Minutes of previous meeting

NHO will investigate this as a possible drainage project. Clerk to pass on relevant information regarding the position of the drain.

Shelf Lane

Clerk will follow up progress of work with NHO so that Cllr Tucker can co-ordinate his work.

Highway Community Enhancement Fund

The Parish Council has a project in mind between Coombeshead and Ringborough Cross. Clerk will liaise with Cllr Tucker regarding an estimate for the work. The Parish Council will meet 50% of the costs. Once costs are known and agreed by the Parish Council, the clerk will submit an application for approval. Cllr Tucker undertook to take photographs of the work already carried out in Shelf Lane for submission to the Highway Community Enhancement Fund committee.

Update on excessive lorry traffic at Wick

Cllr Key advised that a new planning application for a slurry lagoon has been submitted to EDDC but had not yet been allocated to a planning officer. There was a general discussion about the whole situation and it was agreed that the new application will be subject to close scrutiny by interested parties. The escalated operation had caused considerable bad feeling in the parish. Cllr Key assured the Parish Councillors that they would be kept fully informed regarding the new application and will be given ample time to submit their comments. A suggestion was made that there might be merit in holding a parish meeting to discuss the situation but no firm agreement was reached on this.

Parish Maintenance

Stones on the road had been caused by the lorries travelling to and from Wick. Now that the operation has ceased, the situation has improved.

FOOTPATHS AND BRIDLEWAYS

Cllr Nancarrow was away and there was nothing to report.

ENVIRONMENT/COMMUNITY FACILITIES

Community policing report

No crimes have been reported.

Defibrillators

The clerk now has the two defibrillators. A parishioner in Beacon has kindly agreed for the second defibrillator to be placed at his property. Both cabinets that house the defibrillators need to be connected to an electricity supply. Cllr Tucker gave the clerk a telephone number of an electrician who may be able to do this work and the clerk will arrange. The Parish Council will meet the cost of the work involved. The clerk has a list of parishioners who would like to attend training courses. The clerk will liaise with Otter Brewery as they have their own defibrillator.

Overhanging hedges

Letters have been sent to property owners whose hedges overhang the highways and cause a traffic hazard. The Parish Council will continue to monitor the situation.

Play Area Inspection

The Safety Consultant has carried out an inspection of the equipment at Millrise and the Village Hall. The slide at the Village Hall has come to the end of its working life and the Parish Council is of the opinion that this should be removed. The clerk will contact the Safety Consultant for the name of an approved contractor to carry out the work. It was unanimously agreed that the Parish Council will pay for the removal and any reinstatement of turf, for example, that may be necessary.

Insurance Renewal

The insurance quote and cover were reviewed and it was unanimously agreed to renew the insurance. It was also agreed to insure both defibrillators at an annual cost of £23.10 (proposed by Cllr Pulman, seconded by Cllr Barlow).

MADAGASCAR EDUCATIONAL TRIP

We are a group of year 9 and 10 students from Court Fields School in Wellington going on a 16-day expedition to Madagascar. We will be visiting one of the communities in Madagascar that our school has been supporting for a number of years and looking at some of the environmental and community projects that our fundraising has gone towards. We will also be helping out in a Children's Home in the capital, Antananarivo and at a primary school which Court Fields fundraising efforts have helped to build.

Madagascar is one of the least developed countries in the world and after recent political crisis quality of life remains low for the majority of the population.

As part of the overall experience the students that are undertaking the trip have to make significant efforts to plan and carry out a number of fundraising events to contribute towards the cost of going on the expedition. This is an important part of the project for the children as it helps the group bond as a team and develop responsibility.

So far this year we have held bingo nights, numerous cake sales, BBQs in the park and organised an auction. We have fundraising stalls at all the local events including street fairs and music festivals. We have mastered the art of bag-packing in local supermarkets and later this year we will be appearing in carnivals dressed as lemurs! There are lots of events planned in the lead up to Christmas including a large craft fair featuring lots of local crafting groups as well as our own festive creations. Despite all these events, we still have a significant amount of money to raise so we would be grateful for any support than can be given!

GARDEN JOTTINGS

Of all the flowers that brighten the late summer and autumn border none is more versatile or varied than the Dahlia.

Dahlias were brought across from Mexico in the seventeen hundreds, and plant breeders in Europe and America soon discovered they could easily be developed into many shapes, sizes and colours.

At first Dahlias were regarded as food plants, like potatoes, maize and tomatoes another staple import from the New World. Dahlias however proved not to appeal to the European palate of either beast or man, and so were restricted to decorative use.

Yet Dahlias are still sometime available as edible tubers. The purple dahlias at last summer's Flower Festival were grown from a packet of edible dahlia seeds. You can either sell your dahlia or eat it. So I haven't tried them yet as food.

After the original introduction the plasticity of the Dahlia soon became apparent, and by 1815 catalogues already contained Dahlias of many different shapes and sizes. Today Dahlias are exhibited in many different forms - single, collerette, pompom, cactus, decorative, and in most colours, although there seems still to be no blue dahlia.

The main problem with dahlias is that they will not stand frost. A single frost blackens and destroys the leaves. So they are not planted out without protection until frost danger has passed. Tubers kept dry and frost free over winter can be set out from early May. To grow, tubers must have a growing shoot.

Some gardeners prefer to leave their dahlias in the ground all winter. Most years, especially in the south, this is easily successful, new young shoots appearing at the surface late May or early June. Protection from slugs and snails is essential. Tuber kept in the ground over winter should be covered with a thick layer of litter - straw, fallen leaves, compost. This will stop frost penetrating to the roots.

Dahlias can easily be raised in spring from cuttings. Books usually recommend taking shoots at about two inches, although I take them smaller. Always try to cut the shoot off below a leaf joint. Dip in a rooting compound and pot up in a loose mixture of sterilised potting compost and say perlite. Keep damp in a plastic bag for a few days in a light place without direct sunlight. Keep warm especially at night. They will soon grow young leaves and can be transferred to larger pots. Later water carefully with a weak 7-7-7 fertiliser.

Cuttings like this grow quickly and should give you a good display by late August and September when some of the earlier border plants are over.



The Little Ginger Cat

"We have your cat. Here, with us in the house. Would you like to come and get it?" said the voice on the phone.

The call came from a nearby house. Our elder son, his wife and daughter live in a quiet cul-de-sac in a small town in southern California. The houses are all recently built in the standard earthquake zone pattern. (This consists of a reinforced concrete floor slab, with all walls of lightweight timber panels.)

The housing areas had gradually spread over what had formerly been completely open country. This is a desert landscape mostly of rounded and steep hills with sharp deep valleys. The vegetation is dry scrubby brush with here and there a parched bush or tree. Land difficult to build on remained undeveloped, and there were also large areas used as public open spaces and nature reserves. These had public information boards with warnings to walkers about dangers such as rattlesnakes - stay on paths, don't poke them with a stick, allow them space to retreat etc. The impression of the area for a visitor is that there are zones of urbanisation in an otherwise completely natural wild landscape.

Our son's neighbours in the street were a mix of ages but all were quiet. Some had teenagers, some families were working, and some retired (including a former Los Angeles policeman who told me he never went anywhere near that city without his .45). The call about the cat had come from a very friendly Indian family about three houses away. "So will you come and get it?" Our daughter-in-law looked across at their cat, comfortably curled up on the end of the sofa. "I don't think it's our cat," she said tactfully. The Indian lady was quite sure about it, so the cat was collected.

It was indeed similar at first glance to the family cat, Roo. Both were ginger of almost similar size. Roo was plumpish but not fat, with soft longish fur. The new cat was of slighter build, just a little smaller, and the fur shorter and less soft. With the two cats together, it was easy to see the differences, but apart? It was not difficult to see why the neighbour had thought it was the family cat.

Roo did not take kindly to the visitor. Skirmishes broke out. However, the family decided to look after the new cat for a while. What else could they have done? They put up "Cat Found" notices locally on trees and posts, awaiting a response from a distraught owner. There was none.

After some weeks, and with feline hostilities breaking out less frequently they decided they would look after the new cat. She was taken to a vet for health checks and injections and so on, and gradually became one of the family like Roo and Dakota, the Long-haired Collie. She was eventually given the name Jemima. Roo, senior cat, tolerated her presence, but Jemima generally remained a little nervous. Even when Roo was not around she rarely seemed to be completely relaxed. Her face was smaller than Roo's, and sometimes I thought she was a little cross-eyed, but that could just be me. Her nerviness gradually lessened, and she took to sleeping outside our bedroom in a corner of the landing. Eventually she allowed me to pick her up and be nice to her, although I sometimes felt that she was just being indulgent with me.

In the garden Jemima was alert for visiting birds in the tops of bushes and shrubs, always way out of her reach. Frequent visits by hummingbirds were watched carefully, for sometimes even parents with young would perch on convenient lines and strings. At dusk, she would often stalk along the tops of the boarded fencing and sometimes would settle down quietly. At other times she would climb the fence, jump off to the far side and be gone for hours.

Because of the occasional absences of both Jemima and Roo, the family kept a chart of feeding for the three pets. It was noticeable that Jemima was sometimes absent for many hours. And then one day Jemima did not turn up at all, nor the next day. Her chart remained blank. The cat just did not appear for food. After a week there was still no sign of the little ginger cat.

The family anxiously searched nearby in the local roads and gardens and open spaces. They began to feel very worried and upset at Jemima's absence and at a weekend they determined to carry out a wider much more thorough search. Finally, after some days and in the rough ground of the nature reserve, they found a little piece of evidence. It was a small patch of skin with very recognisable ginger fur. They were absolutely sure it was Jemima and that she was dead. With great sadness they went home.

The last remains of Jemima were buried in the garden with a little marker.

What had happened to her? The most likely explanation is that she was caught by coyotes. At dusk we sometimes heard them howling as they caught something. It is a disturbing chilling noise.

A sad end for a little ginger cat.

<u>Transition - A bit more than apple pressing and seed swaps</u>

A personal question but do you:-

1) Rent your home? 2) Lease your car? 3) Make monthly payments to buy your washing machine and television?

The old way of doing things was to buy your home, purchase a car outright and to buy consumer goods such as refrigerators, washing machines and home electronics. A problem with the non "bricks and mortar" side of consumption is that when it is superseded by something better, you end up binning these items and they become scrap or worse landfill.

So what about a better way of doing things? An enterprising lady called Isla Roundtree has come up with a concept of recycling children's bicycles. Her company is called Islabikes (islabikes.co.uk) As I understand it, she will rent a bike out until that item is either worn out or no longer fit for purpose (due to outgrowing this size). The reasoning for this is that Islabikes will be responsible for that bike and will, upon its return to the factory recycle the whole of the bike's components into rebuilding them into a "new" one.

As raw materials may become scarce and expensive, this will change the way that manufacturers deal with the public. Just imagine if we changed the way we did business with the manufacturers of cars, washing machines and other white goods and consumer electronics. Much would depend upon these manufacturers designing their products for easy repair, reasonable monthly costs and ultimately recycling of all component parts.

The Islabikes website is well worth a visit and you should watch her three minute video for inspiration. So what are you waiting for?!!!!!!!
