LUPPITT PARISH COUNCIL

Clerk's report of a Meeting of Luppitt Parish Council held at Luppitt Village Hall, on Tuesday, 6 November 2018 at 8 pm

Present: Cllrs John Thorne (Chair), David Barlow, Gavin Brake, Paul Prettejohn, Brian Pulman, Andrew Tucker, David Key (EDDC), Rosalind Buxton (clerk), Roger Hicks (Chair of Steering Group) and one member of the public

Receive apologies for absence

Apologies were received from Cllrs Tom Nancarrow (Vice-Chair) and Christine Ryder. Cllr Thorne thanked Cllrs Nancarrow and Brake for chairing the Parish Council meetings during his absence. He was pleased to be back. Cllr Thorne welcomed Roger Hicks and the member of the public to the meeting.

Minutes of previous meeting

The Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday, 2 October 2018 were unanimously agreed and signed as a correct record of that meeting.

Declaration of Interest

Cllr Tucker declared an interest in item 2.1.1, the planning application at Sunningdale Lodge, as he carries out work there.

PLANNING

Applications (for comment, support or objection)

18/1707/FUL – Sunningdale Lodge, Wick, Honiton, EX14 4TY – remove existing pole barn and replace with timber block stable

The Parish Council has no issues with this planning application.

The meeting was then suspended to allow the member of public to participate in the next item.

18/0506/FUL – **Green Mead, Luppitt, Honiton, EX14 4TP** – update This planning application had been passed under delegation by Planning East even though the Ward member, Cllr Key, had objected on the grounds of over-development of the site. When a Ward member registers an objection, the planning application should be decided by the Development Management Committee but this procedure had not been followed. The Parish Council had also objected on the grounds of over-development of the site. The parishioner explained that new plans had been drawn up after the first set had been rejected by Planning East. The Parish Council had not seen the latest

set of plans so the clerk will follow up with Planning East. The Parish Council and Cllr Key assured the parishioner that their dispute is with Planning East not following set procedures and not with the parishioner. The parishioner appreciated this assurance.

The meeting was then resumed.

Update on email sent to Enforcement Officer regarding Buddhist Monastery

Cllr Brake had been made aware that several unauthorised buildings have appeared on site and one of them is on common land. In the adjacent field, there are now several log cabins which appear to have been erected without planning permission. The Enforcement Officer has agreed to investigate when he is next in the area. Cllrs Thorne and Pulman had also visited the site that day.

Neighbourhood Plan

Roger Hicks reported good progress on the Neighbourhood Plan.

Questionnaires will be delivered by a team of volunteers to every property in the parish, hopefully, by the end of the week (11 November). Roger advised that the Vice-Chair had resigned but still wished to remain part of the Steering Group and to continue being the lead on A Balanced Community. Another Steering Group member had stepped in at very short notice and completed the online version. Without this input, there would have been no opportunity to complete the questionnaire online. Roger said that the Steering Group committee has worked hard to finalise the questionnaire. The results will be analysed over the Christmas period and Roger is hoping for completion of the Neighbourhood Plan in 2019. He believes it will be a very useful document for the Parish Council. Cllr Brake also thought it would be a helpful document in future for people to refer to when submitting a planning application.

Consider future presentation on new National Policy Planning Framework (NPPF)

Roger Hicks and Cllr Ryder had attended a seminar. There are some differences in the new NPPF, some of which affect farm and other buildings. The Government's proposal to build 300,000 houses per annum has been challenged. A more realistic target may turn out to be 150,000-250,000. The Greater Exeter Strategic Plan, which now takes precedence over the Local Plan, has been created to oversee any additional development, resulting from the Government's proposals, that Devon County Council has to meet. It may be helpful for Roger to give a presentation on the NPPF to the Parish Council in the future.

Policy Writing Course

It was agreed that Roger Hicks should attend this course – proposed by Cllr Barlow, seconded by Cllr Tucker.

Parish Maintenance

Lengthsman Project

The clerk reported that the application to the Highways Maintenance Community Enhancement Fund for £2,000 towards the lengthsman project has been successful. Cllrs Pulman, Thorne and Tucker, as part of the Parish Maintenance Committee, will meet to discuss the work involved and the best way forward.

Road Signs

The clerk will purchase three road signs 'Unsuitable for heavy goods vehicles'. One will be located at Ewins Ash, a second one at Langdale with one spare.

Road Warden Scheme

The clerk had received an email from Highways to say that their training provider, South West Highways, is closing its training centre.

Grit Bins

It appears that not all of the grit bins have been filled. The clerk had sent a map, drawn up by Cllr Brake in 2011, to the Neighbourhood Highways Officer showing the location of the grit bins. The NHO was grateful for this information and would make sure that all grit bins are filled. The clerk had received an email from a parishioner suggesting a grit bin should be located below Blackenfields Farm. The Parish Councillors did not feel that this was the best position for a grit bin but the Parish Council would be happy to supply

the parishioner with some salt if this would be of any help. The clerk was asked to research the cost of two grit bins and take the figures to the next meeting.

FOOTPATHS AND BRIDLEWAYS

There was no report as Cllr Nancarrow was not at the meeting.

ENVIRONMENT/COMMUNITY FACILITIES

Community Policing Report

No report had been received.

Final arrangements for Battle's Over – a Nation's Tribute – 11 November 2018

Cllrs Brake, Prettejohn, Pulman and Thorne agreed to act as marshals and will wear reflective jackets. The bonfire will be lit at 7 pm to coincide with the lighting of beacons nationwide. The firework display will start at approximately 7.30 pm. The event has been advertised in the July/August, September, October and November editions of the Luppitt Packet so it is hoped there will be a good attendance to mark this special occasion. The clerk had received another email from the parishioner who had originally voiced concerns about the effect of fireworks on animals. Cllr Ryder had been in touch with the parishioner to offer assistance. Cllr Brake suggested that the clerk should write to the parishioner outlining the steps that the Parish Council had taken.

Contribution to Luppitt children's Christmas party

It was agreed to donate £150.00 towards the cost of the party (proposed by Cllr Brake, seconded by Cllr Barlow).

Parish Council wreath for Remembrance Sunday

The clerk has purchased a wreath from the Royal British Legion. Cllr Thorne will lay the wreath at the Remembrance Sunday service on behalf of the Parish Council.

ADMINISTRATION

Quarterly check - internal financial control

Cllr Barlow has checked the cashbook and reconciliation for the quarter ended September 2018 and confirmed that all is correct.

Privacy Statement

The Parish Council approved the privacy statement drawn up by the clerk based on the format used by the Society of Local Council Clerks (proposed by Cllr Tucker, seconded by Cllr Pulman).

Agree S137 payments (donations) for 2019/20

The following S137 payments were agreed: TRIP £55.00; Citizens Advice Bureau £55.00; Royal British Legion £20.00; Devon Air Ambulance £100.00;

British Heart Foundation £50.00; Luppitt Packet £160.00; Luppitt Children's Christmas Party £150.00. The clerk will draw up a projected budget for 2019/20. It is possible that there will be a contested election for the Parish Council in May 2019. The clerk will make provision for the costs of an election in the projected budget (see below under Correspondence).

Agree meeting dates for 2019

The Parish Council will continue to meet on the first Tuesday of each month at 8 pm. However, the first Tuesday in January 2019 falls on New Year's Day so the January meeting will be on Tuesday, 8 January 2019.

WinZip software programme

The clerk has purchased this programme to enable her to open the electoral roll files. The cost is £31.14 and it was agreed that she should be reimbursed for this.

Correspondence

The Electoral Services Manager at EDDC has sent out details of approximate charges (based on 2015) that will apply if the Parish Council has a contested election in May.

Chairman's Discretion

The clerk had some good news to pass on regarding the grant for the Neighbourhood Plan. The clerk has been advised that grants received before 2015 are now being discounted so instead of being only eligible for £1,600 that the clerk had applied for, the Parish Council is entitled to a total of £9,000. The grant acceptance letter reads: 'Grant you applied for: £1,600.00; Grant amount offered: £3,110.00. The grant awarded differs from the grant that you applied for because the grant is as per the itemised budget except that item 2.5 has been increased to £2,160. As discussed with the applicant, if the increase in funding is not needed in full for the analysis of the questionnaire, you can seek a grant variation to use it for consultancy support. The group are encouraged to make a further application for grant support to complete the plan if needed.' Grant money received must be spent within six months or the end of the financial year (31 March 2019) whichever is the soonest

There were no further questions and the meeting closed at 10 pm.

St Boniface and the Christmas tree.

According to legend, Devon-born St Boniface (680 – 754 AD) left England as a missionary to convert the pagans of Frisia and Germany.

He came across a group of people worshipping the sacred oak of Thor and about to sacrifice a boy. In anger, Boniface cut down the oak. To his amazement, a young fir tree then sprang up from the roots of the oak. Boniface took this as a sign of Christian faith. He decorated the tree with candles, so that he could preach at night. And so the tradition started.

Boniface became the first papal legate north of the Alps and was instrumental in the spread of papal influence. He was martyred in Frisia in 754 AD.

However, the first documented Christmas trees are public ones in town squares in Livonia. The first was at Tallinn (now Estonia) in the New Year 1441 and the second at Riga, (now Latvia) in 1510.



THE HEATH PHARMACY by D.Street

It is a flashback, a moment's vision, a brief memory of a past long gone. I am three probably. I am outside one of the main railway stations in Bradford - Bradford before Ukrainians arrived or Pakistanis were invented. My mother is holding my brother. He is being shown to my grandmother for the first time.

Before me and above, stretches a giant spider's web of wires on poles. There are blue trolley buses in the distance with two sticks going up to the wires, and there are trams on tracks with one stick up to the wires. And there are single decker buses with two hugely long sticks going up to the wires. My grandmother called them tracklesses. People are moving about in lines.

I have forgotten how we all got onto a No 1 tram to Wibsey or a No 2 tram to somewhere else. How the tram juddered and screeched its way up steep slopes and round tight bends to Great Horton, where my grandmother lived. She lived in Roslyn Place, a grey cul-de-sac with grey cobbles and grey pavements going down to vaguely seen railway line.

Each July in the early forties at the end of the school term, I was sent up to Bradford with my brother to get away from the bombing. We lived just outside London in a chemist shop on Hounslow Heath. Everyone said on, but actually it was at or opposite. Dick Turpin was supposed to have held up unwary coaches on the sequestered vales of Hounslow Heath. In summer we blackberried there from tall bushes full of thorns and sunlight.

We lived at the Heath Pharmacy, a nineteenth century, some said eighteenth century, 2 up and 2 down cottage, with the shop tacked onto the front. At the back a two storey annexe jutted out into the garden. This is where the kitchen was, though we called it the scullery.

To get into the scullery you went down two concrete steps. One corner was filled with a large brick coal-fired copper. But my mother always sent the washing to the laundry each week. In another corner was the sink with a cold tap and a wooden draining board. In the morning you could easily find large brown cockroach beetles scuttling about the sink. One day I dropped the kettle when a beetle fell out of the tap as I was filling it.

We had a gas oven and a gas fridge. How a gas fridge works I've no idea, It had a long vertical metal tube or flue at the back with a pilot light at the bottom. When it first arrived it towered above me, but over the years I managed to cut it down to size. My mother sold it in 1947 for £5. Or was it £10? It was one of them anyway.

If you would like to read about goings on at the Heath Pharmacy in the forties, I will give Lindsey another piece sometime. For instance you can find out how I was sent one evening to bury the shop takings under the apple tree in the back garden.



From Rev John Hayhoe

It is part of the rector's lot, I suppose, to have to anticipate the various seasons and festivals of the Christian year, so that notices, leaflets, letters, service sheets for one season are being prepared in the middle of another; and so it is that I am writing this letter for the Christmas magazine just after Remembrance Sunday. The parish wardens, Sara, our administrator, and I have already been planning for next year arranging services, PCC meetings and APCM are already in our diaries! By the time you read this letter The secular Christmas season will be well under way.

It is unfortunate when Advent is swallowed up by pre-Christmas events,

though entirely understandable that schools for instance, should want a Christmas celebration before term ends; but I fear the desire to start the Christmas build-up so early is a sign that, as a society, we are not good at waiting. The world has become a very impatient place. We move from one supermarket checkout queue to another in an attempt to get served more quickly, only to discover that the first queue was moving more quickly after all! Try sticking to a rigid 30 miles an hour in a speed limit area, and you'll soon become aware of people desperate to overtake, so that they can reach the next red traffic light three seconds before you do! Of course, the revolution in information technology encourages us to expect a very rapid response in all our communications. So we become less used to having to wait. I feel we are in danger of losing the importance of the present moment; of being alert as to what is going on around us; of really stopping to listen to other people and being sensitive to them, of enjoying the here and now rather than rushing on towards the next thing. If this is how we sometimes live, what chance has God of being allowed in to our hearts or 'getting a word in edgeways'? Christmas demands a time of preparation if we are to take seriously the need to be challenged by Christ's coming among us. We all know the uneasy feeling, perhaps even panic, when a guest turns up too early for a meal or meeting and we wish we had given ourselves more preparation time. A visit can be truly spoiled in that way.

So may we make time to be ready for the coming of Jesus at Christmas, by asking whether we are prepared for his demands, for what he expects from us his disciples, and being attentive to the present moment when he might challenge us and expect a response from us in life's many ordinary situations. May I wish you all a very happy and blessed Christmas and all good wishes for 2011.


A SEASONAL QUIZ - ANSWERS

- 1 Balthazar, Caspar and Melchior were first named in the sixth century, but were not identified in the Gospels.
- 2 Any thin shiny metal, but generally believed to be silver.
- He was Duke of Bohemia 907 to 929 AD. The patron saint of the Czech Republic, he was murdered by his brother.
- 4 Ten ladies dancing.
- Nomadic herders in the Arctic zones of Sweden, Norway, Finland and Russia. These are peoples like the Sami (Lapps).
- 6 Mexico. They were first domesticated by the Aztecs. They were brought to England in the 1540s.
- 7 Prince Albert, Queen Victoria's consort, brought the idea to England from his native Germany.
- 8 Wales. South Africa and the United States also have Bethlehems.
- 9 They both mean water of life. The first is Irish/Scots Gaelic (whisky), and the second is French (brandy).
- Of course he's real! Santa Claus is a North American corruption of the Dutch name for Saint Nicholas. He was a Bishop in the fourth century, and is the patron saint of Greece and Russia, children and sailors.
- Potatoes were first cultivated in the Andes of Peru and Bolivia about 1800 years ago. The Spanish brought them to Europe in about 1570. [In a market in a small town in northern Ecuador I counted about 25 different varieties.]

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
