### **LUPPITT PARISH COUNCIL**

### Clerk's report of the Annual General Meeting of Luppitt Parish Council held at Luppitt Village Hall, on Tuesday, 8 May 2019 at 8 pm

**Present:** Cllrs John Thorne (Chairman), Beth Hooper, Brian Pulman, Christine Ryder, Andrew Tucker, Rosalind Buxton (clerk), Roger Hicks (Chairman of Steering Group) and 3 members of the public

### Receive apologies for absence

Apologies were received from Cllrs Tom Nancarrow (Vice-Chairman), Paul Prettejohn, Michele Turner, David Key (DCC) and PCSO 30017 Darren England

Appointment of Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Planning Committee, Parish Maintenance Committee, Tree Warden, Snow Warden and P3 Co-Ordinator Cllr Pulman took the chair and invited nominations for Chairman. Cllr Hooper proposed Cllr Thorne and this was seconded by Cllr Ryder with all in favour. Cllr Thorne then took the chair and invited nominations for Vice-Chairman. Cllr Nancarrow had indicated that he was willing to stand as Vice-Chairman if nominated. Cllr Nancarrow was nominated by Cllr Pulman and seconded by Cllr Ryder with all in favour. It was agreed unanimously that the whole council would be members of the planning committee (with a quorum of three) and that the whole council (excluding Cllr Tucker) would be members of the parish maintenance committee (with a quorum of two). It was agreed unanimously that Cllr Pulman would act as co-ordinator of the parish maintenance committee, that Cllr Tucker would continue as Tree Warden, Cllr Pulman would continue as Snow Warden and, subject to his consent, Cllr Nancarrow would continue as P3 co-ordinator.

### Receive the Chairman's Declaration of Acceptance of Office

Cllr Thorne signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office of Chairman.

### Receive the Acceptance of Office from Parish Councillors

All councillors, except Cllr Nancarrow, have signed the Acceptance of Office and Code of Conduct form. The clerk will arrange for Cllr Nancarrow to sign his form as soon as convenient.

After the above protocols had been completed, CIIr Thorne welcomed everyone to the meeting and thanked all the councillors for their hard work and for their confidence in re-electing him as Chairman. He was happy to continue in this role. CIIr Thorne had a special welcome for our two new Parish Councillors, Beth Hooper and Michele Turner. Unfortunately, Michele was unable to attend the first meeting.

### Appointment of Bank Signatories

It was agreed to remove David Barlow and Gavin Brake from the list of signatories

and replace them with Tom Nancarrow and Christine Ryder.

### Minutes of previous meeting

The Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday, 2 April 2019, were unanimously agreed and signed as a correct record of that meeting (proposed by Cllr Tucker and seconded by Cllr Ryder).

### **Declaration of Interest**

Cllrs Pulman and Tucker declared an interest in item 2.1.2 (planning application for Oakdell) because Cllr Pulman owns the property and Cllr Tucker has carried out work there.

The clerk handed out a Declaration of Interest form to ClIr Hooper and one to ClIr Ryder. The clerk will hand a form to ClIr Turner on her return. All other Parish Councillors confirmed that there are no alterations to their Declaration of Interests from last year and the clerk has established with EDDC that there is no need for those Parish Councillors to submit new forms.

The clerk has checked with three different bodies and confirmed that it is only declarations of pecuniary interests relevant to any matter being discussed that precludes a councillor from taking part in a discussion or voting on that particular matter. Whilst it remains good practice to declare any interests, many interests do not affect a councillor's right to discuss and vote. The clerk will advise as instances occur.

### **PLANNING**

Applications (for comment, support or objection)

**19/0073/FUL and 19/0074/ LBC – The Old Post Office, Luppitt, Honiton, EX14 4RT –** construction of single storey rear extension (revised scheme to 18/1003/LBC and 18/1005/FUL); alteration to approved layout of study

The Planning Committee comprising ClIrs Thorne, Pulman and Ryder had a site visit at the Old Post Office on 25 April (comments were due to be submitted to Planning by 1 May). The Parish Council has no objection to the plans. Since issuing the Agenda, the clerk has received another notification of plans for the Old Post Office. She will make enquiries to see if there are material differences.

**19/0756/FUL** – **Oakdell, Luppitt, Honiton, EX14 4SJ** – alterations to and conversion of detached store to form annex

The Planning Committee comprising Cllrs Thorne, Nancarrow and Ryder had a site visit at Oakdell on 30 April (comments were due to be submitted to Planning by 2 May). They were happy with the plans and the Parish Council has no objection to the application. Cllr Ryder said it was a good example of what the Steering Group has been looking at in the Neighbourhood Plan. Cllr Key had advised the clerk that

he had received a copy of a letter of objection that had been sent to the Planning Officer but there was no address or name on it.

### **Field at Pennythorne Cross**

The clerk had received a letter from the Enforcement team at EDDC to say that further investigation was called for and a site visit will be arranged.

### **Neighbourhood Plan**

Roger Hicks reported that sub-groups have been reviewing the responses to the questionnaire in relation to their particular sections and have submitted their suggested recommendations for amendments to the draft Plan. These have been sent to all Steering Group members and there was a brief discussion at the Steering Group meeting on 1 May. Steering Group members now have until the next Steering Group meeting on 29 May to study the proposals and submit any comments. The Plan will be modified when all amendments have been discussed and agreed.

Roger Hicks has received a first draft of the Parish Character Assessment report. At the Steering Group meeting on 26 June, representatives from the Blackdown Hills AONB, the Blackdown Hills Farming and Woodland Group and the Devon Wildlife Trust will be giving a short presentation with the objective of increasing environmental knowledge in the parish. It was hoped that as many parishioners as possible would attend.

### **Housing Survey Needs**

The New Development sub-group (led by Mark Hickman) had proposed at the Steering Group meeting on 1 May to ask EDDC to carry out a Housing Needs Survey with immediate effect. Roger would prefer to wait until the Neighbourhood Plan is completed before doing so as he says that this will delay completion of the Plan and he also feels that residents may feel disinclined to complete another questionnaire, especially when some of the questions may be interpreted as being very intrusive. When completing the questionnaire, 73% of residents had indicated that they believed affordable housing to be extremely beneficial, very beneficial or somewhat beneficial and this provided a compelling reason to establish whether there was, in fact, a need for affordable housing. A Housing Needs Survey is essential to find out whether or not there is a requirement in Luppitt parish for affordable housing and unless 'need' could be established there would be no basis for providing affordable housing.

At the Steering Group meeting on 1 May, it was decided to proceed with the survey as soon as possible by a vote of 8 in favour and 4 against. It was brought to the Parish Council for a final decision. EDDC fund 3 surveys per year; the PC will be expected to contribute £300 towards the costs. Cllrs Thorne and Pulman agreed with Roger that it would be better to delay the survey until the Plan has been completed but Cllrs Ryder, Tucker and Hooper felt it should be carried out now so

the decision to carry out the Housing Needs Survey as soon as possible was carried by 3 votes to 2. The clerk will liaise with Mark Hickman for the next steps.

### 3.0 HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC

### 3.1 Parish Highways programme - update on Items to Report as follows:

### **Parish Maintenance**

The clerk will write to Highways commending them on the extensive road repairs that have been carried out. She will also draw their attention to the fact that ditches near Mountstephens and the telephone exchange (by the double bends) have been filled in.

### School Lane

It was agreed to ask Cllr Tucker to quote for work at School Lane – to form a concrete drainage channel for approximately 45 metres to take excess water. Some form of retaining bank will be needed. The clerk said that if the work was quite major she could apply to the Highways Maintenance Community Enhancement Fund for 50% of the cost.

### **Safety Railings**

The clerk had heard from the NHO who was under the impression that the railings between Stoneacres and Lamberts Lane were on private land. The clerk will write to advise that they were erected by Highways.

### Gigaclear

The clerk has heard from Mike Cavanagh of Gigaclear who said that outstanding repair work will be carried out. The clerk will advise of other problem areas – by Shaugh on the corner at the left going towards Langford; drain inlet at Greenlands – contractors have dug in the brick culvert and laid tubes through the culvert.

### **FOOTPATHS AND BRIDLEWAYS**

### Footpath 14

The Parish Council authorised Cllr Tucker to start work on the walkway at Footpath 14. The P3 fund has granted £1,500 towards the project. Cllr Thorne reported that he had found dead animals that had been dumped at the top end of Footpath 14 near lack's House

### Definitive Map Modification Order – Footpaths 60, 61 and 62 (Luppitt)

The High Court has quashed the decision dated 17 September 2018 and so these Orders have to be redetermined.

### **ENVIRONMENT/COMMUNITY FACILITIES**

### **Community Policing Report**

The report was received after the meeting. No crimes have been reported for the month of April.

### **Annual Parish Meeting and Devon Freewheelers**

There had been a disappointing turnout at the Annual Parish Meeting but the founder of Devon Freewheelers had given a very powerful talk which was both moving and very amusing. Cllr Thorne proposed that an S137 payment (donation) of £100.00 should be made annually to Devon Freewheelers. This was seconded by Cllr Tucker with all in favour.

### **Broadband in Village Hall**

Gigaclear have confirmed that they would consider providing a Broadband connection to the Village Hall free of charge once the area goes live later this year. Cllr Pulman will get reaction from the Village Hall committee about this. It needs to be established who will use it, when most people have Broadband at home, and there would also be the problem of accessing the hall when it is locked.

### Quarterly check – internal financial controls

Cllr Barlow has checked the cash book and reconciliation for the quarter ended March 2019 and confirmed that all is correct. Cllr Ryder has agreed to take over responsibility for checking the clerk's quarterly figures.

### Annual Audit

Cllr Thorne signed the bank reconciliation for the end of the financial year. This had also been signed by Cllr Barlow who has checked through the bank statements, invoices and financial transactions carried out during the year. Papers will be sent to

the internal auditor shortly so that the accounts may be presented to the Parish Council at next month's meeting. They will then be sent to the external auditor.

### VAT Reclaim

The clerk confirmed that a VAT claim and the Employer Payment Summary had been submitted to HMRC. The clerk confirmed that repayment of the VAT claim in the amount of £2,407.94 has been received.

### Clerk's hourly rates

It was agreed that the clerk's hourly rates should be increased by 27p per hour in line with the new terms negotiated by the National Association of Local Councils.

### Correspondence

An email from the Blackdown Hills Parish Network inviting the nomination of a representative to attend general meetings was noted.

### Play Area

The clerk will write to Elizabeth Rose to confirm that the annual inspection of the play area at Millrise should take place.

### Insurance

Insurance documents have just been received. The clerk will check the contents.

### GARDEN JOTTINGS

The trouble with growing squashes we find is the males are not out at the same time as the females. Books never seem to mention this difficulty.

I suppose if you've a field of squashes, there'll be a few males out early enough. But with only a couple of plants in the poly - and they're aggressive big spreaders - there's quite a problem.

Pumpkins and melons are pretty much the same. And there're cucumbers too. Marrows and courgettes were easy enough when I grew them years ago. There were always more than I needed. Melons have such small flowers you can't be certain if you've pollinated them at all.

This is where bees come in. Once you've got some bees buzzing around the flowers, they'll soon solve any problem.

Unfortunately there's been a decline in bee numbers recently. This is is giving some concern. Apart from your pumpkins and melons and cucumbers, bees pollinate many different crops free of charge. As well as the colonial hive honey bee, which many people keep, sometimes to pollinate their orchards, there are other types of bee.

Not all bees are colonial. Jacki encourages osmia bees, also called mason or solitary bees. She has several bee boxes, as in the picture. Osmia bees can also be used to pollinate orchard crops.

Osmia bees breed in hollow tube-like structures, where they have spent the winter. In the spring the males emerge first and wait for the females to come out. They have even been known to drag them out. After mating the males soon die. There are no workers among osmia bees.



The fertilised females search out a hollow tube-like home. They visit flowers and carry nectar and pollen inside as food for the eggs they lay there. They plug the end with mud. The eggs hatch, eat the stored food and pupate into cocoons until the following spring, ready to come out and pollinate your next year's crop.

### PACKET...

- 1. A small pack, package or parcel (1530); in early use, especially the State parcel or "mail" of despatches to and from foreign countries.
  - 2. Short for packet boat (1709).

A packet boat is defined as a vessel plying between two ports for the conveyance of mails, also of goods and passengers; a mail boat. Clearly it was originally a boat maintained for the conveyance of The Packet of state papers.

In the early 1800s land transport was slow and difficult. Roads were generally little more than rutted cart tracks, and railways were in their infancy. Every port in the South-West supported a 'packet service' of vessels trading to and from either London or Bristol. These small ships were generally smacks (sloops or barges), light single-masted sailing vessels. The smack rig was the simplest and smallest of all sail arrangements. (However, in the later part of the nineteenth century larger single-masted ships made quite long passages).

The smack was the common carrier for the South-West. They provided links between major cities and almost every place around the coast, to every beach, creek and estuary. They often ran onto the shore to unload cargoes like timber, stone, cement and other bulk materials. Coal, for instance, was delivered to the open beach at places like Sidmouth, Budleigh, Lynmouth and so on. Such activities persisted, perhaps surprisingly, well into the twentieth century. There is a photograph of coal being unloaded on Weston Super Mare beach in 1931, though surely this must have been one of the last of such occasions.

Modern shipping trade passes Lyme Regis by, but it was once a very busy port and shipbuilding centre. In 1849 a barque of 250 tons was launched, though this is possibly the largest ship ever built here. The ship-yards at Lyme, Topsham and Bridport built fast smacks for the packet trade between London and Leith. Bridport in particular could build much larger vessels than the smack, and in 1853 built a ship of 1,000 tons for the Australia route.


As a port, Lyme served a hinterland which seems surprisingly large to us today. The National Maritime Museum at Greenwich has a flyer from

1828 for the packet service to Lyme. 'The ship Commerce, master Randall, loading at Carpenter Smiths wharf, Southwark for Lyme Regis.'

The flyer offered 'Takes in Goods twelve working days' for a long list of places which include Axminster, Bridport, Chard, Crewkerne, Colyton, Honiton, Ilminster, Tiverton, Taunton, Sidmouth, 'and all places adjacent.' There are a few conditions in the small print: 'the wharfinger will not be accountable for loss by fire, vermin, high tides, leakage, act of God, the King's enemies '....etc. The wharfinger, Richard Willson, has written the receipt (on the flyer) on 8 September 1828 for eight packages, 6s 6d (six shillings and six pence).

We have no way of knowing if these or any of the other packets on this packet went to Luppitt.

David's article about his father's wonderful pharmacy brought back happy memories of shopping when young with my Mum.

Do you remember the wonderful smells from an old fashioned Chandlers shop? All items of metal hung from the rafters, pails, cans, etc. The floor was strewn with hay bits and the open bins were filled with seeds, corn, oats, locust beans, etc.

Paraffin was served from a small machine like a petrol pump, likewise turpentine. Elf and Safety would have a fit!) A certain amount was always dripped on the floor, which added to the overall ambience.

The open doors back and front brought in wafts of horse and hay, and if I looked pleadingly at the shopkeeper, I would be given a locust bean to chew on the way home. I'm not sure where the locust bean comes from, I know they were given to horses!

Another favourite was the dairy. Betty (Mum always said "Hello Betty") would cut a slab of butter from the block with butter - pats, shape it, weigh it and wrap it in paper for us. The cream was in a big vat, and was dipped out with a ladle and poured into a jar.

All these interesting little shops soon disappeared. The "Continental Butcher", The "Pie and Eel shop", and a funny little place called "The Hole in the Wall". Literally that, you stood on the pavement and leaned on the counter. They sold tobacco, I think.

### From Rev John Hayhoe

"It's easy to be critical of what's going on around you, at work, home, church, community or society in general, and to grumble about the shortfalls to anyone who'll listen. It's a much harder, but more impressive thing to be a person of blessing, and to be an agent of transformation marked by love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity and self control." C. S Lewis (Celtic Daily Prayer 2 p1365)

In the last parish magazine I wrote about the need for our communities to come together putting aside any differences or animosity we might feel in the light of opposing positions over Brexit. As I was writing that article I was wondering whether there was any hope of any progress being made – as I sit at my computer writing again Mrs May is being urged to break off the talks the government have been having with the Labour Party (the date being 14 May). I do hope that Brexit will be resolved and that we can get on with a new tomorrow.

I can remember thinking in 1986 as I left Northern Ireland at the end of my last tour there with the army that the two sides would continue fighting and that I could see no end to it. Despite the occasional horrific event like the murder of Lyra McKee in the Creggan just the other day Northern Ireland is living a new tomorrow that I could not envisage thirty three years ago.

We know that we do not live in a perfect place and we know most certainly that we do not have a perfect government nor a perfect church; we also know that our families are not perfect nor are the places where we work or have worked. I know also that even the very best of us on occasions can be critical and do grumble, and yes, that does include the Rector more often than he would care to admit! Even though we do know there are bad apples we also know that the vast majority of politicians, bishops and priests, teachers, police, doctors and nurses, business people are trying to do their very best for those

for whom they are responsible or who they serve. We know that actually the vast majority of the people with whom we live do wish the best for their neighbours even if the noise of their dog or their son's motorbike can be irritating.

In the quotation above C.S.Lewis makes my point much more succinctly and then leads on to a quotation from St Paul's letter to the people of the city of Ephesus (then Greek but now in Turkey). He urges us to a person of blessing, to be an agent of transformation marked by *love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity and self control.* He also makes it clear that this is very difficult, that achieving this is very impressive. Northern Ireland has been transformed over the last thirty years by people trying to do just this. The United Kingdom would be transformed if we all tried to do just the same – whether we leave the European Union or not! Our individual influence on our nation is limited but we can all bless our own communities and make them even better than they are already.
