DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD IN THE VILLAGE HALL ON WEDNESDAY, 10 APRIL 2019, AT 8 PM

<u>Present</u>: Cllr John Thorne (in the chair), Rosalind Buxton (clerk) and 8 members of the public

Devon Freewheelers

Daniel Lavery and his wife started Devon Freewheelers in 2009 and financed the project by selling their house. In 2005 whilst giving birth to their son by caesarean operation, Mrs Lavery suffered severe complications which resulted in her having to have seven blood transfusions and a fight for her life. She was a patient in the Royal Victoria Hospital, Belfast, and the blood was brought to the hospital by a volunteer blood biker. Blood bikers have been running for 50 years. At that time, Devon was the only county in the country without a blood bike service which was when Daniel and his wife decided to start Devon Freewheelers. They have 82 volunteers and are wholly financed by public donations. They now have 5 staff in their offices in Honiton. Daniel explained that as well as transporting blood, they also support hospices, Devon Air Ambulance, take breast milk to neo-natal units and transport human organs. Daniel ensures that all his volunteers are suitably trained. They have carried out over 5,000 emergency calls.

They are part of the GP improved access scheme. They collect blood samples from every surgery in the evening and deliver to the Pathology laboratories. This is funded by the Clinical Commissioning Group to the extent of providing fuel expenses. All bikes are serviced every six weeks and it costs £250,000 per annum to run the service. They do not charge for their services and because the NHS is funded, Devon Freewheelers cannot apply for funding. Without their services, the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital could spend up to £1,000 per day on taxis. Even though they are saving this amount, the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital is not allowed to subsidise Devon Freewheelers but has given them a commendation. Everyone present felt this simply didn't make sense and a parishioner asked was there anything to be done about it. The MP for Tiverton & Honiton, Neil Parish, is actively working to change the legislation and Daniel suggested that people could write to Neil Parish to express their support for funding for the future.

John Thorne thanked Daniel for his interesting talk which was both moving and often very amusing. He had certainly given all those present something to think about and illustrated what a useful service Devon Freewheelers provides.

2 Welcome and Apologies

John Thorne welcomed everyone to the 2019 Annual Parish Meeting for

Luppitt. Apologies were received from Cllrs David Barlow, Paul Prettejohn, Christine Ryder, Mrs A Fry, Beth Hooper.

3 Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday, 17 April 2018 It was proposed by Lindsey Dalgety, seconded by Jean Hooper and carried unanimously that the Minutes of the meeting held in the Village Hall on Tuesday, 17 April 2018, were signed as a correct record of that meeting.

4 Chairman of the Parish Council's Annual Report There have been 12 Parish Council meetings since the last Annual Parish Meeting in April last year. Our meetings are very informal and are open to the public and it would be nice to see more residents attending.

At last year's AGM of the Parish Council, I was elected as Chairman and Tom Nancarrow as Vice-Chairman. I would like to thank Tom for chairing meetings in my absence.

There have been 4 Certificates of Lawfulness applications and 9 planning applications, including the resubmission to seek planning approval for the construction of a slurry lagoon at Higher Wick (the last application having been refused). This continues to be a very contentious issue within the parish. The Parish Council continues to object to this application and has outlined in detail the many concerns it has over the viability of the project, the possibility of an environmental catastrophe and the safety of the structure. The Parish Council will not reconsider its recommendation to refuse this application until such time as the applicant provides a structural engineer's design and report that can be studied in detail and provide evidence that the project is viable.

Roger Hicks has continued to lead the work on Luppitt's Neighbourhood Plan and a questionnaire was hand-delivered to every property in the parish. 256 residents completed the questionnaire either online or a hard copy. (This compared to 77 replies to the 2014 questionnaire.) An independent company in Exeter, Transform Research, was responsible for inputting and collating all the data and produced a very detailed report. The Steering Group as a whole is now considering the findings of the report to ensure that they are reflected in the Neighbourhood Plan. Work to date has been financed by grants (not the precept) and I should like to thank Roger and all the volunteers in the Steering Group for their hard work.

The condition of our roads remains a priority. We have joined the Road Warden scheme and Cllr Brian Pulman attended a two-day training course. Amongst other things, this enables us to repair potholes in the parish that do not meet the Highways' intervention criteria.

We were granted just over £400 from the Parishes Together Fund which has been used towards the extensive ditch clearing work that has been carried out throughout the parish. We also applied for and were granted £2,000 from the Highway Community Maintenance Enhancement Fund towards lengthsman's work

We successfully applied for funding from Locality and purchased two grit bins which were placed at Moorlands Lane and Millrise.

I'd like to thank Andrew Tucker for all his hard work throughout the parish and for going out and clearing the roads to make it safer and easier to move throughout the parish during the snowfall in early February.

Chris Tottle continues to look after the play area at Millrise and we are grateful to him for his efforts.

We have been granted £1,500 from the P3 fund to provide a walkway across the deep bog at footpath 14. This work will be carried out in the next few months.

The precept remained unchanged at £11,000. EDDC no longer provides the Council Tax Discount Grant which last year amounted to £106.

Donations from the precept totalling £620.00 were given as follows:

TRIP – £55.00 Luppitt Children's Christmas Party - £150.00 East Devon Citizens Advice Bureau - £55.00 Royal British Legion - £20.00 plus £80.00 raised at the BBQ on 11 November Devon Air Ambulance - £100.00 Luppitt Packet - £160.00

We held a commemoration event on Hartridge on Sunday, 11 November 2018, to mark 100 years since the end of the First World War. It was very well attended and the successful barbecue made a profit of £80.00 which was sent to the Royal British Legion. A parishioner again organised a spectacular firework display and the Parish Council is very grateful to all the volunteers involved for their hard work.

This year has marked the end of the four-year term for Parish Councillors. Gavin Brake and David Barlow have stood down from the Parish Council and I should like to thank them both for their hard work and the contribution they have made over the years, especially Gavin who was Chairman from 2008 until 2014 and then Vice-Chairman. Despite much publicity, only two

residents applied to become Parish Councillors so that means there will be an uncontested election. We are looking forward to welcoming Michele Turner and Beth Hooper to their first Parish Council meeting on Wednesday, 8 May (change of date).

Finally, I'd like to thank our District Councillor, David Key, and all the Parish Councillors for their support over the past year.

Report from Police

There was no report but the Parish Clerk gave the following details that have appeared in the Parish Council Minutes since the last Annual Parish Meeting.

- -Theft other including theft by finding filed as no lines of enquiry.
- -One assault offender know to victim.
- -There were 4 crimes committed compared to 6 in 2017/18 but the Parish Clerk pointed out that the Parish Council does not always receive monthly reports.

7 Questions

There was a general discussion about police presence in rural areas. It is true that Luppitt has a very low crime rate but because of the PCSO's heavy workload, he has not been able to attend a Parish Council meeting since he took over in early 2018. It was agreed that it is important just to see a PCSO every now and then to build up a relationship which in turn provides reassurance to those living in the parish.

There were no further questions. John Thorne thanked everyone for attending although he was very disappointed at the low turnout. The meeting closed at 9.15 pm.

Receive apologies for absence

Apologies were received as above. Cllr Barlow was unable to drive after a knee operation and so missed his last meeting as a Parish Councillor. He had asked the clerk to pass on his good wishes to the other Parish Councillors. Cllr Thorne said that Cllr Barlow's contribution to Parish Council meetings would be greatly missed.

Minutes of previous meeting

The Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday, 5 March 2019, were unanimously agreed and signed as a correct record of that meeting (proposed by Cllr Tucker and seconded by Cllr Pulman).

Declaration of Interest

Cllr Tucker declared an interest in item 2.1.1 (planning application for slurry lagoon at Higher Wick Farm) because he carries out work there.

2.0 PLANNING

The meeting was suspended to allow members of the public to participate in the next item.

2.1 Applications (for comment, support or objection)

2.1.1 19/0298/MFUL – Higher Wick Farm, Wick, Honiton, EX14 4TY – construction of manure slurry lagoon and associated earthworks and landscaping for existing dairy unit complex

Additional documents had been submitted by the applicant's agent which included responses to the Parish Council's list of objections. Cllr Thorne asked the applicant, who was present at the meeting, how long the project was going to take. The applicant was unable to give a timeframe as it would all depend on the number of lorry-loads permitted each day and when suitable material would become available. Cllr Thorne repeated the Parish Council's demand for a structural engineer's design and report. The applicant

said this had been submitted but Cllr Thorne pointed out that there was only a design drawing in the documents, not a full report and this was not acceptable. It was pointed out that it is impossible to quantify the amount and type of material needed for the project without a detailed structural engineer's design and report.

The applicant was asked why a cut and fill solution could not be considered, thus reducing the profile of the lagoon especially as it is in the AONB. Cllr Key said that the original application in 2010 stated that the slurry lagoon would be dug into the side of the hill. Despite all the material that has been imported to date, the applicant confirmed to Cllr Thorne that no work has yet started. The applicant indicated that he would be doing the work on the slurry lagoon but Cllr Thorne said that the Parish Council would insist that an experienced specialist contractor with a proven record of carrying out a project of this size and complexity would need to be employed.

The agent has stated that the borrow pit, which will provide the clay needed to line the slurry lagoon, will remain as it is. EDDC's landscape architect confirms that the project cannot be satisfactorily screened and will be contrary to various local planning policies. Cllr Key pointed out that, if built, the structure should not be touched for 18 months to allow for settlement so it will never provide a quick solution for the applicant. It was pointed out to the applicant that a structural engineer may well suggest another solution that would enable the applicant to resume his farming enterprise more quickly. Cllr Thorne repeated that the additional documents have not changed his opinion that the site is totally unsuitable for a project of this size and magnitude and the Parish Council would continue to recommend refusal of the planning application.

The meeting then resumed.

- 2.1.2 19/0555/CPE Old Spurtham Farm, New Road, Upottery, EX14 9QD certificate of lawfulness to establish the use of existing buildings as two dwelling houses (use Class C3) at Ostlers Cottage and The Byre
- 2.1.3 19/0564/CPE Otter Falls, Old Spurtham Farm, New Road, Upottery, EX14 9QD certificate of lawful development to establish the lawfulness of 2 no existing utility buildings
- 2.1.4 19/0565/CPE Otter Falls, Old Spurtham Farm, New Road, Upottery, EX14 9QD certificate of lawfulness to establish lawful use of building as one dwelling (use Class C3) at Harvest Cottage, in breach of occupancy restriction condition

All these applications were considered. Cllr Key could not give any further information on the background of these applications. It was agreed that the clerk would advise EDDC that the Parish Council did not have any information that could be used to support or dispute these applications. Cllr Tucker suggested that there might be information contained in the Minutes where past planning applications had been discussed. The clerk will follow up. All Minutes

before 1999 are in the Archives.

2.2 Neighbourhood Plan

Roger Hicks said that good progress is being made. The Steering Group subgroups are now considering the responses to the questionnaire which will be presented at the next Steering Group meeting when it will be decided what will be taken forward to the Neighbourhood Plan draft. Fiona Fyffe will start work on the Parish Character Assessment on Monday, 8 April.

2.2.1 Housing Needs Survey

The members of the sub-group concerned with New Development are keen to commission a Housing Needs Survey from EDDC bearing in mind the questionnaire responses, but Roger feels that this is not the right time. The matter will be discussed at the Steering Group meeting, with the final decision taken by the Parish Council.

2.2.2 Campaign for the Protection of Rural England seminar and membership

Cllr Ryder and Roger Hicks had attended a seminar in Exeter when the Housing Minister was present. There will be more emphasis in the future on design quality. Over the years land prices and building costs have hardly moved but development costs have soared. Several developers have reneged on their undertaking to build affordable houses. One interesting point emerged that all waste material generated should be re-used on site rather than taken elsewhere. It was not felt necessary for the Parish Council to become a member of the CPRE at this moment.

3.0 HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC

3.2 Parish Maintenance – potholes

Cllrs Pulman and Tucker confirmed that a number of potholes throughout the parish have been repaired. This work has been carried out under the Road Warden scheme. The Parish Council was granted £2,000 from the Highway Community Maintenance Enhancement Fund towards lengthsman's work and it was agreed to use this towards the cost of repairing the potholes.

3.2.1 Road at Higher Wick

The farmer, who was at the meeting, confirmed that the road has been cleaned.

3.2.2 Grit Bins

The clerk confirmed that she has received funding from Locality for the cost of the two grit bins.

3.2.3 Safety Railings

The clerk will continue to follow up.

3.2.4 Gigaclear

The clerk had received an email from Gigaclear on 8 March but has heard nothing further. She will follow up.

4.0 FOOTPATHS AND BRIDLEWAYS

The clerk confirmed that she has received £1,500 from the P3 fund towards work on Footpath 14. This item will be brought forward to the next meeting.

5.0 ENVIRONMENT/COMMUNITY FACILITIES

5.1 Community Policing Report

The clerk referred to an email received on 12 March which outlined the plans to reduce the number of PCSOs in the next year. It seems that our present PCSO has a heavy workload and it is unclear what form the monthly reports (if they are continued with) will take. Cllr Ryder pointed out that there had been a hefty increase in the amount claimed by the Police & Crime Commissioner for Devon and Cornwall on the Council Tax bills that had recently been issued. Cllr Key said there would be an increase in the number of police personnel. However, it was not clear how this would impact on rural areas.

5.2 Litter Pick

Cllr Thorne thanked Roger Hicks and Robin Turner for organising the successful litter pick on 9 March and to all the people who gave up their time to take part. Several black bin bags were filled.

5.3 Annual Parish Meeting

Cllr Thorne has arranged for a representative from Devon Freewheelers to speak at the Annual Parish Meeting on 10 April. It was agreed to give a donation of £75.00 (proposed by Cllr Tucker, seconded by Cllr Ryder). The clerk has asked Cllrs Key, Chubb and Pulman for their reports and will write to Cllr Brake for his report on behalf of the Commoners.

The clerk will advise the new date as soon as it is established whether or not there will be a contested election.

6.4 Internal Audit Arrangements

The clerk has been advised by DALC that it is in order for Cllr Brake to carry out the internal audit once he has stepped down from the Parish Council. The clerk will establish with Cllr Brake the terms under which he will carry out the work (proposed by Cllr Tucker, seconded by Cllr Pulman).

6.5 Correspondence

An email from Devon Communities regarding a Community Response Team event was noted.

A letter from the Merchant Navy Fund asking for support by flying the Red Ensign on 3 September was noted.

CHAIRMAN'S DISCRETION

The clerk suggested that in future she would claim for the cost of paper and printer toner instead of charging for each photocopy. The costs would be lower and this was thought to be a good idea.

DEVON CREAM TEA

Claudia Severa writes...

...to her friend Sulpicia Lepidina, as told in the April Packet. But the text of Severa's letter is not as it was printed in the Packet, but is as follows 'on XI September, sister, for the day of the celebration of my birthday, I give you a warm invitation to make sure that you come to us, to make the day more enjoyable for me by your arrival, if you are present...Give my greetings to your Cerialis...' (Lepidina's husband, the commander of Vindolanda).

So, I confess, I entirely made up the wording of the invitation as previously printed. Severa did not have a Dumnonii maid who served her cream teas. There was a clue - the by-line was dated I/IV/MMXIX (1/4/2019). But everything else is true.

Writing this confession has reminded me of other April Fool stories. One of the most memorable to me was in the late1950s or early 1960s. A BBC evening news programme warned viewers of an impending drastic shortage of spaghetti. This was due to poor growing conditions in the Italian spaghetti orchards, and there was film of the trees with sparse crops of spaghetti hanging down rather forlornly.

Perhaps rather more believably, a national daily (perhaps The Times) featured a rather long article about London Transport buying a fleet of driver-less buses. It discussed the various problems that had to be overcome. There are no driver-less buses yet, but today driver-less cars are being road tested.

Moving forward to this year, the Guardian had an article on 1st April about personal hygiene. I'm really not sure if this was a spoof or not. There was detailed advice about the best way to take a bath, and so on, including hints on how to wash your bottom. GARDEN JOTTINGS

I've been looking at plant pots in my garage. There's quite a lot there really. They're all plastic except for a couple of old earthenware ones I've had for years.

When I first got interested in growing plants, all pots were earthenware or terracotta. I once asked Terry Jones (he bred new Nerines and Crocosmias) why he didn't use plastic pots. He said he was too old to. Well, I'm just the other side of the dividing line. Of course some seriously zealous growers might always have carefully eschewed the use of plastic pots altogether.

Earthenware pots didn't get waterlogged so easily. Plants could breathe in them. You have to be rather more careful with watering plastic pots. The more leaves and roots the easier, within reason. Earthenware pots broke when you dropped them. When you wanted to wash them, you needed a stiff brush and plenty of elbow grease. It was the sort of job young apprentices started off with.

The pots in my garage are all black or orangey. There are odd ones in pale green or pink. The older ones may be a little soft, possibly because of solar radiation, but really they last. Nothing eats them, nothing rots them. This the virtue and the vice of plastic pots, and of all plastic everywhere. After about seventy years people have noticed that plastic stays around. It doesn't disappear or recycle.

I remember discussing the word non-biodegradable some forty years ago as a word, not as nuisance. The first time I noticed plastic lying round was in 1968. I was travelling on a train from Rome to the Italian lakes. There were sheets of polythene lying along field edges.

I thought farmers might have been growing early tomatoes. I thought too if there's enough of it lying around, some organism will learn how to eat it. If organisms can eat sunlight, surely they could feed on plastic. But the time scale for that is likely to be astronomical.

Now that people are realising that plastic is poisoning the earth and living things - there's a good chance of it getting into food and even into us - viable alternatives are being developed. Plant pots for instance made out of biodegradable materials are beginning to come onto the market - wood fibre, coir, rice husks, bamboo, miscanthus grass. Plastic envelopes made from potato starch are now being used. Ingenuity will improve these alternatives. Some break down sooner, some later. Plastic pots need to last.

Plastic has become a serious problem. Technology doesn't always seem an unalloyed utopia. A basic course in environmental issues could be a desideratum for budding technologists.

Dare I write about Brexit!

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


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
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


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Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle - Focus on Domestic Plastics

My previous article about rubbish and recycling dealt broadly with what personal measures we could be taking to improve recycling, both on the "doorstep" and also using municipal facilities. This month I am focussing on what we can do to identify and isolate non recyclable plastic wastes at home.

The Blackdown Hills Transition Group have been considering how the "Ecobrick" initiative could be used to collect plastic waste that either cannot, or is currently unable to be processed by Somerset Waste Partnership.

At our April meeting we were fortunate to have Ben Bryant from Devon Recycling Network in Totnes, who came to talk about Ecobricks and their use. Please check on the internet to see how these are being used in the world, especially where poorer countries and their environments are blighted by plastic waste materials. The following link is a good place to start: www.ecobricks.org

Their experiences in dealing with the threats caused by this type of pollution are uplifting, especially as the approach requires little input apart from physical effort to isolate those materials into plastic drinks bottles.

Whilst Ecobricks could not be used in mainstream building projects in the UK, it is possible that they could be incorporated into ancillary structures such as building composter bins or sea defences.

Ben will be looking into where these can be used and reporting back to the group soon.

My own quest to isolate any non-recyclable plastics and produce Ecobricks has resulted in stopping over 5.5 kg (12.1 lbs) of material going into landfill, since the beginning of the year.

What could you all do? Why not come and join us at our next meeting on June 5th at 7.30pm at The Holman Clavel pub? You will be most welcome to join in the conversation.
