Biologists tell us that each eco-system has a key animal, which if lost, causes widespread damage to the whole eco-system and even complete collapse. In Europe that keystone animal is the humble Bee. The Bee faces a number of threats including urbanisation and loss of habitat, insecticides, infestation with viruses and mites, and loss of important food sources. In this edition we publish an article from Devon Wildlife on the subject of insects and what we can do to encourage them.

# ACTION FOR INSECTS

Action for Insects is a new campaign by Devon Wildlife Trust – and its 46 sister Wildlife Trusts around the country – to help butterflies, bees and our other six-legged friends.

Many insect species have suffered catastrophic declines in recent decades, due to changes in farmland management, loss of wild habitat and use of pesticides. But with concerted action, we can turn things around for some of the most amazing creatures in our countryside and gardens.

## Why we need to take action

Few things conjure up a perfect image of the countryside quite like a bee buzzing from flower to flower. A butterfly fluttering across a meadow. A beetle making its way through tall grass. They paint a wonderful picture, don't they? The reality, however, is less than idyllic. Modern living has seen insect numbers drop at an alarming rate. We risk losing some of them forever.

## Life systems depend on insects.

Insects make up the majority of our wildlife and are truly remarkable in the roles they play. Pollinators such as bumblebees, hoverflies and moths are vital for passing on pollen to help flowering plants reproduce. And **approximately three quarters of the crop types grown by humans rely on pollination by insects.**

Insects break down and decompose organic materials. They turn dead matter and waste into usable forms, like fertile soil for healthy crops. And let's not forget that insects are food for many other animals including birds, bats, reptiles, amphibians and fish.

## Can you help?

Devon Wildlife Trust needs local communities and individuals to help in the fight to stop insects from dying out. Two new action guides are packed full of information to help both community groups and individuals take practical action in their local neighbourhood and at home. Just taking a few simple actions can have a big impact if we all act. Together we can reverse insect loss and help the wildlife that depends on insects to thrive once more.

## ASH DIEBACK IN DEVON

Ash dieback is a disease affecting ash trees in our countryside and towns. It threatens to wipe out over 90% of Britain's native ash species and is likely to cause safety issues that need to be managed by landowners in high-risk areas.

Loss of ash trees, woodland, and hedgerow species could have a major impact on the wildlife and character of Devon's countryside.

Across our network in Devon we have many ash trees which if left untreated could potentially cause a significant hazard. That's why in Devon we will be removing trees infected with ash dieback that pose a risk to the highway, over the next 5 years, these works will take place in all areas.

## GARDEN JOTTINGS

It's very cloudy today, not exactly much good for staycations - dull and grey and drizzly with a chilly wind. Looking out of the window, I see some of the agapanthus have blown over. They are flat on the ground. It's mainly the stems on the outside of the clumps that have gone over, the ones that tend to come up sideways instead of upright. There aren't many flowers coming from the middle of the clumps. This is what happens to perennials that have been there some time. Growth is on the outside. The centres are old and deadish. I'll have to split them up and keep the younger outside parts before replanting them.

It's the same with other perennials too - the phlox, the brunnera, the golden rod. There's a lot of couch growing among these perennial clumps. I can get its entire root out when I transplant. It's about the only way to get the whole root out without chemicals. The best time to do this is just after flowering, when the plant is growing new roots for the next year. With the agapanthus September is just right after they've finished flowering. The soil is still warm and the sun not too powerful. Of course you might think agapanthus are tender for our winter and prefer to pot them up for setting out next spring.



My agapanthus are not the only things blown by the wind. Leaves are coming off many trees. There are apples on the ground. Something's been eating them. Most of the trees are not yet quite ready to go into autumn mode, but the cherry tree's usually early. Its leaves already cover the lawn. There are plenty of ivy leaves too to be swept up. Evergreens have their own time for leaf drop. Evergreen leaves are not ever green. I'm always finding dead laurel leaves lying round. Even as I write in September oak leaves lie all over the garden. These do not usually fall until well into November.

Not having a leaf-blower, I'd better get out brush, broom and besom ready for the coming autumn onslaught. There may still be plenty of time for warm days, but the midday sun is not high now. Before long we shall be having Charlie descend upon us from the Caribbean. As the atmosphere gradually warms over the years and becomes less stable, we may get Yvonne or even one of her Greek cousins.

### Ingredients:

450g ready made puff pastry	zest and juice of 1 lemon	95g caster sugar
30g ground almonds	1 egg + 1 egg yolk	
60g well drained curd cheese	75g butter	25ml double cream

You will need a shallow tartlet tin and a 5cm round pastry cutter.

Whisk the sugar, egg and yolk until light and fluffy. Melt the butter and drizzle it slowly into the eggs and sugar while continuing to whisk. Add the lemon zest and juice and ground almonds. Sieve the curd cheese through a fine meshed sieve. Add to the rest of the ingredients. Stir thoroughly. Lastly stir in the cream. Cover and put in the fridge to chill. Roll out the puff pastry thinly, cut out circles using the cutter. Press the pastry circles into greased the tin, try and make the centre thinner, so the rim edges of the pastry ease upwards. (We don't want soggy bottoms!) Spoon in about 1 tablespoon of the filling. Do not over-fill as the filling will puff up during cooking and sink as it cools.

Pre-heat the oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes until lightly browned. Cool and lightly dust with icing sugar.

# **CLERK'S REPORT OF A VIRTUAL MEETING OF LUPPITT PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON TUESDAY, 1 SEPTEMBER 2020 AT 8 PM**

**Present:** Cllrs John Thorne (Chairman), Tom Nancarrow (Vice-Chairman), Beth Hooper, Brian Pulman, Michele Turner, David Key and Rosalind Buxton (Parish Clerk)

## **Receive apologies for absence**

Apologies were received from Cllrs Paul Prettejohn, Christine Ryder, Andrew Tucker, Iain Chubb (EDDC and DCC) and Colin Brown (EDDC)

**Minutes of previous meeting** The Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday, 4 August 2020, were unanimously agreed and signed\* as a correct record of that meeting (proposed by Cllr Hooper and seconded by Cllr Nancarrow).

## **Declaration of Interest**

Cllr Nancarrow declared an interest in the planning application at Higher Moorlands Farm, as he employs one of the applicants.

## **PLANNING**

### **Applications (for comment, support or objection)**

20/1125/FUL – Higher Moorlands Farm, Luppitt, EX14 4SY – erection of agricultural barn  
There was a general discussion about the siting of the new barn. Cllrs Thorne and Turner agreed to call round and speak to the applicants.

### **Decisions**

20/1063/FUL – Snooks Farm, Luppitt, EX14 4SB – erection of solar panel arrays – response from EDDC and AONB

The clerk had received a reply from Lisa Turner, the Blackdown Hills AONB Planning Officer, outlining their approach to small scale solar panel arrays. Main considerations would be scale and siting. For any future applications, the Parish Council will ensure that the AONB is consulted so that their input can be incorporated within the Parish Council's comments. The clerk had received a reply from EDDC to apologise for the fact that the officer's report had stated that the site was not in the AONB. She was assured that EDDC planning officers do know which areas are covered by the AONB and that steps would be taken to ensure that this error did not occur again.

20/1088/FUL – Old Spurtham Farm, New Road, Upottery – erection of hay storage barn  
Approval – Cllr Key is following up on an aspect of the planning application.

20/1004/FUL – Higher Moorlands Farm, Luppitt, EX14 4SY – construction of two storey side and single storey front and rear extensions – approval with conditions.

19/2689/VAR - Appeal Decision – The Old Post Office, Luppitt, EX14 4RT

Appeal Ref: APP/U1105/D/20/3249068 – the appeal is dismissed.

### **Neighbourhood Plan**

Cllr Thorne will contact Roger Hicks to see if he would like to attend the October meeting to update Parish Councillors on the progress he has made with the Neighbourhood Plan. The clerk advised that the Government is keen to encourage urban and deprived areas to produce Neighbourhood Plans with grants of £18,000 and free technical advice available. It was noted that EDDC has withdrawn from the Greater Exeter Strategic Plan.

### **HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC**

Parish Highways programme - update on Items to Report:

- \* Loose kerbstones at Millrise – Cllr Key will continue to follow up as work is unsatisfactory.
- \* Several potholes at the lower part of School Lane towards Ringborough Cross and severe edge of road deterioration from Maple Cross to Pound Farm - discussed with and reported to Neighbourhood Highways Officer.
- \* Potholes between Higher Wick and Fortfield houses – clerk to report again.
- \* Urgent attention needed towards Pound from Maple Cross by bungalow on right-hand side – work completed.
- \* Pothole between bridge on New Road and the two cottages – work completed.
- \* Pothole near Little Shelvin – comment from Highways that a repair has been

undertaken or is due to be undertaken.

### **Parish Maintenance**

The Mill Cllrs Thorne, Tucker and Pulman had met the resident to discuss the situation. During the Parish Council meeting, Cllr Tucker rang through with a quote of £780.00 to complete the work necessary. Decision to be carried forward to the next meeting.

### **Grass cutting**

The clerk will follow up with the Neighbourhood Highways Officer.

### **FOOTPATHS AND BRIDLEWAYS**

Gateposts at Footpath 17 Cllr Nancarrow has investigated and two new gateposts are needed. The clerk will report to Ros Davies for action.

### **ENVIRONMENT/COMMUNITY FACILITIES**

**Play area inspection** The inspection of the play area has been carried out and it is rated as a well-kept play area. Cllr Pulman confirmed that the disconnected spring has been replaced. It was agreed that a sign would be placed at the play area outlining Government guidelines on managing Covid-19 risks (proposed by Cllr Nancarrow, seconded by Cllr Turner with all in favour).

### **VJ Day 15 August 2020**

Cllr Thorne said that the proclamation for peace around the world had been read out and he had rung the Church bell 75 times. About 20 people attended – all observing social distancing. The clerk will print out and laminate a certificate of recognition for taking part.

### **Defibrillators**

The clerk has to complete and send monthly reports on the two defibrillators to South West Ambulance Service and it was agreed that because of this the clerk should continue to check both defibrillators. The clerk will ask Cllr Tucker to contact the residents who had undertaken to check the defibrillator at Beacon to thank them for their co-operation.

### **FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION**

#### **Quarterly Check – internal financial control**

Cllr Ryder has checked and signed the cash book and reconciliation for the quarter ended June 2020 and confirmed that all is correct.

#### **Letter from TRIP – update on activities**

The clerk had received a funding request and update from TRIP. It was agreed that they continue to provide useful services in difficult times. It was agreed to send a donation of £50.00 (proposed by Cllr Turner, seconded by Cllr Hooper with all in favour). This is in addition to the annual \$137 donation of £55.00.

### **Parish Council website**

From 23 September 2020, all local council websites have to comply with regulations to ensure reasonable adjustments are made to websites so that they are accessible to people with various disabilities. Luppitt Parish Council has an accessibility statement on its website and the clerk will work through the entire website to ensure that all reasonable adjustments are made.

### **Parish Council meetings**

Some Parish Councillors would welcome a face-to-face meeting but the clerk confirmed that Government and the National Association of Local Councils' current advice is to continue with virtual or remote meetings for the foreseeable future. The situation will be reviewed on a monthly basis.

### **Correspondence**

Leaflets giving information on a support group for adults experiencing mental health difficulties, called Open Arms East Devon, have been received.

**Clerk's hourly rates** The National Association of Local Councils has negotiated an increase in hourly rates backdated to April 2020. The clerk confirmed that she is satisfied with her present hourly rate.

**CHAIRMAN'S DISCRETION** There were no items.

**QUESTIONS FROM THE PUBLIC** There were no questions and the meeting closed at 9.10 pm.
