April sees the start of a new season of illustrated talks at The Beehive organised by Honiton u3a. There is a wide variety of subjects to appeal to all tastes, and visitors are very welcome to attend.

On April 19th, David Follet will be talking about how he turned tragedy to triumph, following a serious road accident in 2007 which left him with a spinal cord injury. He now represents England at Para Badminton and is ranked 22 in the world and number 1 in England.

St Georges Day

The 23rd April marks St Georges Day, and the familiar white flag with it's red cross will be flown in all parts of England, although it is not marked with the same enthusiasm as the St Patrick's, St David's or St Andrew's days it was a major festival in medieval times on par with Christmas, but its popularity waned after England's union with Scotland in 1707.

St George is the only one of our national saints not to have been born here. He was raised in Turkey, and became a soldier in the Roman army, ending up as a personal guard to Emperor Diocletian. When the emperor ordered the persecution of Christians St George refused to follow his orders. He was tortured and executed in 303 A.D. in Palestine, where he is buried. He was canonised in 494 A.D.

The story of St George slaying the dragon is well known. The town of Silene was captured by a dragon. The locals would offer it a human sacrifice every day. One day a princess was chosen, but St George slayed the dragon and saved the people of Silene, who converted to Christianity and the princess gave him a red rose as thanks!

Richard the Lionheart adopted the flag of St George and brought it back to England from the Crusades in the 12th Century, where it was worn by the king's soldiers in battles. The saint was looked upon as a protector – hence Shakespeare's famous 'Once more unto the breach, dear friends, once more'... 'God for Harry, England and St George!' in Henry V.

During the Middle Ages people believed St George was one of the 'Fourteen Holy Helpers' who could help with Plague and Leprosy.

During the First World War – a ghostly apparition of St George is said to have aided British troops during their retreat from Mons.

and the naval commander of the Zeebrugge Raid cited him as an inspiration.



The Order of the Garter (founded by Edward III in 1348) is the highest order of chivalry in the country and the King is at the helm. St Georges cross appears on the Garter badge, and his image is the pendant of the Garter chain. The Garter Day Service is held in St George's Chapel, Windsor every June.

In 1940 George VI created a new award for acts of the greatest heroism or courage in circumstances of extreme danger. The George Cross, named after the king, bears the image of St George vanquishing the dragon. Many First World War memorials also bear the image of St George.





Perhaps we should honour the day more!

I am wandering down the lane from Mount Stephens on my way to the junction at Corner Cottage. It is early morning and I am trying to get a sunrise shot looking back across towards New House farm. It is early April and a month with a loud soundtrack. No male bird with pretensions towards reproduction can keep its mouth shut at this time of year. The atmosphere is always heavy with song, ready to drench any listener who steps outside.

By April, Any male with a decent song should have firmly secured its borders. His neighbours know his tune well and keep a respectful distance, leaving singer and his mate to live in relative peace with their hard won patch of ground.. But it's an uneasy truce, and any break now in the male's vocal output would be disastrous. It would be the equivalent of cutting short an advertising campaign in the human world-suddenly your name would slip from the public's mind, your competitors would win out. In the same way an avian singing slouch would soon loose territory, mate and opportunity. He cannot afford to stay silent.

It is a pleasant morning with high cloud showing in the east over towards Hill End. I am almost at Corner Cottage having passed many wild daffodils, however spring for me begins when the Blackthorn blossoms. Hedgerows that have looked scrawny for months explode into life with thousands of tiny white flowers, clustered so tightly the twigs beneath all but disappear. Its a great source of nectar and pollen for bees in early spring. Given that it's one of the first of our native trees to blossom, it seems strange that folklore associates blackthorn with ill fortune and doom, I prefer to think it's blooming foretells warmer and brighter days ahead.

I spot some tumbling Ravens.
Midnight black from bill to claw.
With wings that can tickle five feet across. A Raven is a bewitching site, particularly in early spring. It shows off its best aerobatics: barrel rolls, gravity defying tumbles, and I have heard it can fly upside down.

I set up my tripod and hope for some orange pink glow to the east. Unfortunately on this occasion the once high clouds to the east have decided to become low clouds and I am out of luck capturing a moody sunrise from this location. This is not an unusual occurrence.

I decide to head back through, and up the lanes towards Mount Stephens, and then down to the church carpark.

However all was not lost! I managed to capture these little chaps on the way home.

A Few More Musings...

Intro

In a previous Packet, in a little time warp in my mind, I imagined a couple of off-duty Roman legionaries in the middle of Exeter. They were in short skirts and sandals, seeking warm pants and socks. Of course, this was just a little light-hearted fripperyness on my part. You have to have a little fun when writing things for the Packet.

However, there is apparently a widely held belief that Roman soldiers in colder areas like Britain wore clothing more suitable for warmer places like Rome. This isn't true; they adapted to local conditions. But they didn't wear skirts anyway.

Our two legionaries, let's call them Lucius and Quintus, are having a little R&R. They've been here in Isca now for months and months. There has been no fighting; they have been worked very hard renovating parts of the camp, replacing thatched wooden buildings with stone and tile constructions. Now they have just had hot baths, removing all the sweat and grime leaving their skin a healthy-looking Mediterranean bronze. After a few games of dice, they are now fully relaxed, and they are looking forward to a guiet stroll in the village which has developed around the camp.

They have no worries about the local population, the Dumnonii. They know that they have a reputation for hospitality, and that they have been dealing with visiting traders from Gaul and Lusitania for many years. Small tubby ships have brought cargos such as amphorae of wine and oil, and returned with local produce like cattle, pigs and wool.

Our legionaries also know that when Vespasian led the invasion into the South-West many years earlier, the Dumnonii apparently didn't put up resistance. This had been unlike the neighbouring tribe to the east of the Axe, the Durotriges. They had been totally overwhelmed in their huge and carefully defended fort, and had suffered a savage and brutal defeat. It was the policy of Rome to severely punish such resistance, but a surrender without a battle could result in favourable terms. There were of course many advantages to peoples under Roman protection.

Accordingly, Lucius and Quintus are not wearing any armour. They are quite relaxed, but they are each wearing their sword and dagger. Their clothes are standard issue, of which the main item is a tunic. In length it is cut to be below the knee but it is always gathered up at the waist

and secured with a belt or two, so that the lower edge is above the knee or mid thigh. The military belt is an important part of the uniform, for it is not only functional with rings or frogs for attaching scabbards, but a kind of badge of honour. Someone guilty of a minor misdemeanour might be made to stand prominently without his belt.

Isca

Lucius and Quintus are wandering through the streets, which are mostly roughly paved. The huts of the local people line the streets, and some have opened their fronts where they are offering local produce or services. Lucius is hoping to find someone selling the highly intoxicating local apple wine which seems very popular. Quintus, however, wants to find something to eat first and is hoping to find a pie maker. Maybe they will find some of those curious meat pies with the halfmoon shape.

They are also keeping their eyes open for the local girls. They all have dark hair and much paler skin than the girls back home, and are very attractive. They might even find one whom they'd be happy to marry. Some of their older friends had already married local girls, although this was officially frowned upon. Such friends hoped to retire with some savings and a pension (after 20 years' service), buy a local farm,

and settle down with a family.

Exeter

Today the camp exists only in the buried floors and foundations. Much of the later Roman city wall remains. The wooden and turf huts of the Dumnonii have long ago disappeared into the soil. In the centre of the modern city a few fragments of Roman street remain. Around these ancient relics are the pedestrian areas and buildings of Exeter 2023.

Across these pavings now come two young men. They are freshly showered, in tidy casual dress of ieans and tee shirts. They are clearly not local lads, and their bearing and haircuts suggest they are military. Perhaps they are young recruits, trainee Commandos who have come up on the train from the nearby Marines base. They are obviously having some time off from their arduous training and drills. It might even be their very first time in Devon. They are probably looking for a friendly pub, to sample some local alcohol. Afterwards they might be looking for something quick and easy to eat, and probably looking to chat up the local girls. Now, across the paving come two schoolgirls, young women really. They are obviously local Devon girls, with pale complexions and dark hair, clearly descendants of the Dumnonii of nearly 2000 years ago.

A sudden bright burst of sunshine shines on them as they stop for a moment. One hoicks up her skirt a little, rolling her waistband until the hem is mid-thigh. Her skin is not pale – it has a warmer glow, a touch of bronze.

GARDEN JOTTINGS

Postie's just been. He's put - better mind the pronoun nowadays - she's put a bundle of elastic bands and envelopes in the box. I wouldn't be at all surprised if it's not more gardening catalogues, especially this time of the year. Anyway we're always getting them any time - Parkers, Elwood's, Marshalls, Fothergill's. Or it could be Plant World or the Organic Gardening Catalogue. They're all full of glossy pictures of flowers and plants to brighten up your garden.

This time it's Parkers. Looking through I see there's a couple of pages of ornamental grasses. Grass is a plant you might not much notice 0 just a green thing you can walk on. Maybe play cricket or golf on. Yet grasses range from flat green plants up to towering pampas grass with spikes of feathery plumes nodding in the wind.

RHUBARB

The first of our annual fruits arrives this month and is in it's most delicious and tender state.

Why not make a rhubarb compote? It is great on scones, can be used as a lining in a chocolate tart, or as a topping with natural yoghurt. Below is a naughty but nice dessert, which can be assembled quickly and is sure to be popular.

Rhubarb Eton Mess

400g rhubarb roughly chopped.

3 rounded tbsps. caster sugar

300ml double cream – whipped.

4 meringues – homemade or purchased.

300g Vanilla custard – homemade or purchased.

1 juice and rind orange (optional)

50g chocolate - grated.



- To make the compote gently cook the rhubarb, orange and sugar in a saucepan for 15-20 minutes until tender. Cool.
 - 2. Break the meringues into pieces.
 - 3. Layer the rhubarb, custard, meringue and cream in individual glasses finishing with a cream layer.
 - 4. Sprinkle the grated chocolate on top.

From Rev Penn's Pen

We're in a busy time in the six parishes of The Dunkeswell Mission Community (DMC). I am writing this a few days before we interview for a priest-in-charge of the DMC and by the time you read it we may well know whether an appointment was made and who our new priest-in-charge will be. However it usually takes a good three months between the appointment and their taking up the post, so it'll probably be early July before I can pick up my knitting again.

Meanwhile this month there are some exciting things happening in our churches. You may be aware that in St John's church, Plymtree everyday throughout Lent people have responded to the challenge to read the whole of the bible out loud in church or sponsor that reading. The final chapter of the final book 'Revelation' will be read at the end of the Palm Sunday service on 2rd April at 11am. This will be a really special service incorporating most of the churches of the DMC and to which any and everyone is invited. It's going to be a bit like the service of readings and hymns that churches often have at Christmas. Instead of hearing about the birth of Jesus we will hear the story of the final days before his death on the cross and his resurrection at Easter with hymns and songs that fit in with those readings. At the end of the service refreshments including hot cross buns will be served and we will hear that final chapter of the bible read. I do hope to see as many of you as possible at what promises to be an enjoyable event.

Then on Thursday 6th April at 7pm, in Upottery church there is the traditional Maundy Thursday service, in this service we remember together the last meal Jesus had with his friends before his death on the cross. It's often called The Last Supper and it's the story of Jesus giving his followers the gift of Holy Communion as a way of remembering him throughout all time.

Friday 7th April, Good Friday, sees us at Woolford chapel for the 11am Good Friday service, followed at 12.30 by the Hartridge crosses, three crosses are erected on Hartridge each year and can be seen on the horizon from some distance away, this is accompanied by a very short service and some singing, last year we had warm and sunny weather and it was lovely to be out in the sun with those amazing views.

Easter Sunday sees services in our individual churches once again,

but it's good to see church communities coming together. The final combined service in April is at the Throgmorton Hall, 30th April, 11am where we intend to celebrate together the upcoming coronation of King Charles, in advance of celebrations in individual parishes the following Sunday.

We are sometimes aware of division and infighting between churches and people who would call themselves Christians, whether that be on a local, national or international level, so I wanted to tell you about some of the ways your churches come to worship together from time to time. Even within our six parishes there are a variety of traditions and ways of being church and we have our differences but the most important thing, the thing we have in common, is our love for Jesus and the way we try to live that out day by day. Of course we all get it wrong sometimes, and we, I'm including myself here, often mess up. For Christians there is always the opportunity for a fresh start, how could that not be Good News. All you have to do is say sorry before Jesus and allow your wrongdoing to be wiped out. Sometimes and especially during Lent people want a priest to help them to be able to do this, if that's you, give me a call and we can talk about it.

Now before I get bogged down in theology I would like to invite you to any and all of the church services this month but most especially I invite you to prepare for a time of rejoicing. Rejoicing as we come together as churches this month. Rejoicing as we prepare to celebrate our human king Charles' coronation. Rejoicing as we prepare to welcome our new priest-in-charge. And most especially rejoicing as we celebrate once again all that Jesus did for us through his death on the cross and his resurrection at Easter.



PARISH COUNCIL ELECTIONS

If you are interested in parish matters, please take the opportunity to apply to become a Parish Councillor and take part in the election process. Nomination packs can be downloaded from the Parish Council website or are available from the Parish Clerk. The deadline for completed nominations is **4 pm on Tuesday**, **4 April 2023**.

Luppitt Parish Council meets on the first Tuesday of each month and the meetings last for approximately 2 hours. A variety of issues are discussed at these meetings including responding to planning applications and working to improve the quality of life in the parish.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

You can stand as a candidate to become a Parish Councillor if you are 18 or over on the day you submit your nomination paper and are a British, Commonwealth or European Union Citizen* and comply with at least one of the following:

- you are a registered local government elector in the electoral area in which you want to stand as a candidate;
- you have resided in the area for the whole 12 months preceding the day of nominations;
- you work in the electoral area in which you want to stand and have done for at least the past 12 months;

- you own property in the electoral area in which you want to stand and have for at least the past 12 months;
- you have lived in the Parish/Town or within 3 miles of the boundary for all of the previous 12 months.

* This is expected to change for European Citizens in 2025.

You cannot stand for election if

- · you work for the Council;
- you are subject to bankruptcy restrictions or interim orders;
- you have been convicted of any offence and sentenced to a term imprisonment of at least three months (suspended or not) without the option of a fine within five years of the election date;
- you have been found guilty of corrupt or illegal practices, or are responsible for incurring unlawful expenditure;
- you are subject to the notification requirement of or under Part 2 of the Sexual Offences Act 2003, and the ordinary period allowed for making an appeal or application in respect of the order or notification has passed.
