TIRIDATES

This piece was written some 15 or more years ago for The Packet about early Christians. I offer it in a near gardenless season.

The sun was coming up clear and bright. All Rome was in turmoil of excitement. Tiridates King of Armenia was coming in state. The spectacle would be sumptuous. The Emperor Nero was to install him formally as King of Armenia.

Every street every square – Cassius Dio tells us - was decorated with lights and bunting put up during the previous night. Suetonius says the celebrations had to be put off at the last moment for several days because of the weather. People were bursting. The city was packed. The Forum thronged with Roman citizens ranked by social class, all dressed in white carrying branches of laurel. Everywhere there were soldiers in shining armour, military standards gleaming and weapons glistening. Crowds climb onto roofs to get a better view, so you can't even see the tiles.

The sun rises. Surrounded by the massed phalanx of the Praetorian Guard, with a host of senators, in the uniform of a triumphal general the Emperor Nero strides into the Forum. He takes his eat on the rostrum. Then the King Tiridates and his retinue appear and a mighty roar goes up from the assembled multitude.

During the ceremony Tiridates the King kneels before Nero the Emperor "I am come to you", he announced "to worship you, as I worship Mithra my god".

So during the reign of Nero the Armenians worshipped the Persian

god Mithra. Armenia lies right next to Persia, and they borrowed not only gods from the Persians, but also many Iranian words for their language. Armenian is basically an old Indo-European language — Armenian for cow is cov - full of Persian words.

It's a bit like English, an old German language loaded up with French and Latin words. In the field the English peasants kept cows (German, kuh) and swine (German, schwein). In the castles at table, the posh Norman French ate beef (French boeuf) and pork (French, porc). Nowadays we use both sets of words for these animals.

In 407 AD Bishop Mesrop invented the Armenian alphabet and translated the Bible into Armenian. So the Armenian Christian Church goes back to times long before the Protestant Reformation and long before the great split between the Eastern Orthodox Church and Church of Rome. Then there were several independent churches at Alexandria. Antioch and Constantinople.

Armenia lay on the eastern edge of the Roman Empire. Every so often a



Roman Emperor took a fancy to Armenia and sent the legions in. Communications were stretched and it was soon lost to Persia again.

Despite all the Roman interference Armenia remained an oriental country. I believe there are few borrowed Latin words in Armenian apart from Caesar. The Armenian historian Moses Khorematsi tells us what the local VIP of his time wanted to show off – and it was not two "Jags". The King granted the valiant and honoured Argam the insignia of the second order, as he had been promised, He was allowed to wear a

pearl diadem and two ear pendants, and a purple slipper on one foot. Unfortunately we do not know who among the Armenians, if any, was allowed purple slippers on both feet. And he had the right at banquets to eat with a knife and fork of gold. Forks mind you, didn't come in even for the under civilised aristocracy of Europe for at least another five hundred years. And he could drink from a golden goblet. These honours were Argam's reward for helping the King wrest the country back from Roman occupation.

Minutes of the Last Annual General Meeting

The minutes of the last Annual General Meeting held on Thursday 27th October 2022 at 7.30pm were circulated, discussed, and signed by the Chairperson as a true record.

Matters Arising

Constitution

This matter is on-going.

Electrical Report

The Treasurer has negotiated a new 12 month contract with Smart Energy starting on the 9th November with a considerable reduction in the standing charge from £5.57 per day to 37p per day. Unit rates remain high, and care will still be needed when electricity is used. The committee thanked Steve Berry for his efforts.

• Internet Connection

Mrs Rosewell has been in negotiation with Gigaclear for the past year who initially offered free installation and free connection for 12 months. After many months of negotiation Gigaclear finally offered free use for 12months but asked for a £1000.00 installation fee. The committee did not think this was justifiable given that broadband connection is constantly improving. Mrs Rosewell is in discussion with EE and Voneus in a search for a better provider.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer reported that it had been a good year with revenue comparable to 2022 once the National Lottery Grant of £10,000.00 for new doors had been taken into consideration. Hall hire had increased by 25% and Bank interest rate had increased.

Electricity costs rose by 18%, Water by 30% and Insurance by 10%.

A projector & screen was purchased for £4401.00, as well as PA equipment and a stage extension. The games room lights have been upgraded and fire and smoke alarms fitted.

There are plans to improve insulation and heating.

Adoption of the Accounts

The adoption of the accounts was proposed by Mrs Pearl Pulman and seconded by Mrs Jean Hooper.

Chairperson's Report

Mrs Rosewell (Vice Chairperson) has been acting as Chairperson since the resignation of Mr Stephen Smith, for which the committee is incredibly grateful. She reported that events had been well attended.

Thanks to an enthusiastic committee there were numerous fund-raising events during the year including a Quiz, Christmas Party, New Year's Eve Party, Family Pirate Footpath Fun, Bingo, Coronation Celebrations, Skittles, Pudding Tasting, Movies launch, Murder Mystery play, Pub Games Night, Flower Show & Fete, and a Ukraine Night.

Heating

The Treasurer reported that modern storage heater is 30% more efficient. Modern infra-red heaters are more efficient but do not provide the background heat needed in an older building. He queried whether the large air vents were necessary any longer in a No Smoking Hall.

A new storage heater costs between £700-£800, and as many as thirteen may be needed.

Further investigation is needed. Mrs Murray is to consult other local Village Halls including Upottery, Stockland, Offwell, and Cotleigh. Mrs Rosewell is to consult Broadhembury.

There were no apologies.

Minutes of previous meeting

The Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday, 3 October 2023, were unanimously agreed and signed as a correct record of that meeting (proposed by Cllr Summers and seconded by Cllr Murray).

Declaration of Interest

Cllr Prettejohn declared an interest in the planning application at Yarde Lodge as he supplies and looks after equipment at that location.

PLANNING

Applications (for comment, support or objection) 23/2133/FUL – Primrose Farm, Upottery, EX14 9QE – construction of equestrian manège for private use

Cllrs Turner, Ryder and Summers had attended a site visit on Wednesday, 25 October. Also present were Roger Hicks and the clerk. Particular concerns over drainage and location were addressed. It was agreed that the Parish Council would support the planning application with the following conditions:

The proposed screening is a requirement before the manège is brought into operational use (Neighbourhood Plan policy NE1).

- Suitable measures of mitigation should be introduced to rebalance biodiversity (Neighbourhood Plan policy NE2).
- Assurance that any surface water run-off is diverted away from the lakes and water course (Neighbourhood Plan policy NE2).
- Agreement not to erect external lighting and to submit examples of all materials to be used (Neighbourhood Plan policy ND2).

23/2301/FUL – Yarde Lodge, Luppitt, EX14 4TA – loft conversion incorporating a raised ridge and dormer windows and the construction of a garden building (loft to house bats)

The clerk was asked to arrange a site visit. The clerk will also request an extension to the closing date for comments.

EDDC Emerging Local Plan

The autumn update from the Planning Policy team on progress with the emerging Local Plan includes an invitation for Town and Parish Councils to take part in an online survey of neighbourhood planning activity and intentions. Cllr Turner undertook to complete the survey on behalf of the Parish Council.

Decisions

There were no decisions.

REPORTS

Ward Councillor

Cllr Brown reported that the popular green garden waste service collects from 19,896 homes in East Devon, where the charge per green wheelie bin is £50 per year. This is set to increase to £52 next year.

Currently East Devon do not have a required 5-year land supply which makes it easier for developers to build new homes that would not normally gain approval at the planning stage, potentially leading to inappropriate development in the wrong places.

From 1 November 2023 until 31 March 2024, everyone will be able to park all day until midnight for a flat rate of £2 in all car parks owned and operated by East Devon District Council.

The Friends of Honiton Station have won the gold award, for the second year running, for the Community Planters on the station. They are now working on a project with the Thelma Hulbert Gallery, Honiton Primary school, Honiton Town Council, South West Trains and Devon and Cornwall Rail Partnership to install children's artwork relating to Honiton Lace and the 'Honiton Hippos' on the inside of the footbridge at the station.

For those with a smart phone, Cllr Brown suggested downloading the East Devon app from the Apple App Store or Google Play store, see https://eastdevon.gov.uk/website-help/east-devon-mobile-app/.

This is a very effective tool and easy to use. There are a number of functions that are very popular on it, including the 'Report It' section for all sorts of things from fly tipping to litter and the waste collection section. It can also remind users about collection days and which containers to put out.

County Councillor

Cllr Chubb reported that Devon County Council is going through a major restructure currently of how the 'business' operates, so that it can best serve the needs of the residents of Devon with the physical and financial resources available to it. There is a lot of publicity currently about the financial health of Local Government and a number of Councils issuing what is called a section 114 notice. In effect, this is a declaration that they cannot meet their obligations in producing a legally required budget and 'handing back the keys' to central government to send in commissioners to run services at the minimum legal level. There is often no one single reason for this but certainly growing demand for services, children's in particular, combined with inflation, are major factors in many instances.

Devon County Council took early steps to address this and reorganise and, as part of this, are currently in advanced negotiations with the Department for Education for a very significant financial settlement (called the 'safety valve') and not currently at risk of having to issue a section 114 notice.

Setting a balanced budget early next year is going to very difficult, resulting in some very difficult choices having to be made where core spending power has reduced in real terms by 27% since 2010/11 as Councils remain firmly in the eye of the inflationary storm and finances are under pressure like never before.

The Levelling up & Regeneration Bill recently received Royal Assent and a raft of new measures came into force which the government says will "put local people at the heart of development". County and District Councils will be expected to work with a faster and less bureaucratic planning system, with developers held to account.

Cllr Chubb said that DCC Highways teams have taken an absolute battering this year where climate change flooding events in particular have decimated planned maintenance, but despite that are pressing on with as much of the programme as possible when not dealing with 'risk to life' events or clearing up after flooding, fallen trees and damaged buildings.

They are doing their best to keep all of the plates spinning and Cllr Chubb would ask that residents understand that they must prioritise those 'risk to life' events whilst not diminishing the priority of things residents have reason to contact them for.

HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC

Parish Highways programme - update on Items to Report as follows:

- The potholes at Ringborough Cross have been repaired.
- The clerk had reported the potholes at Fieldhead but had received a
 message that this was an invalid location and not maintained by Devon
 County Council. Cllr Summers wondered if roads not maintained by
 Devon County Council were for sale. The clerk will follow up with Cllr
 Chubb.
- The clerk will report potholes and road deterioration between Pound Cottage and Mohuns Ottery; between Pound Farm Bungalow and Maple Cross; pothole near Shelf Farm.

Luppitt Signs

The clerk had received an email and telephone call from the person dealing with signage at Devon County Council who told the clerk that the £300 that had been taken from Cllr Chubb's budget was for one sign only (the one that has been replaced at Luppitt Cross). Cllr Chubb checked his emails and was quite clear that the money was to cover the missing sign at Luppitt Cross and the one at Mathayes Cross. The email from DCC also implied the same. Cllr Chubb undertook to follow up.

Parish Maintenance

Cllr Tucker was asked to clear the culvert by Maple Cross and the grating by David's corner.

Sign at Beacon

The clerk had received an email from a resident at Beacon drawing attention to the sign that had been knocked down by a lorry. Cllr Tucker was able to give some background information and explained that the lorry driver apparently took a wrong turning during very difficult weather conditions and confusing diversion signs. Cllr Tucker said that a few residents went to help the driver and put him on the right road, thus avoiding any more damage. The signpost has now been reinstated.

Overhanging Hedges

The clerk will continue to send letters to landowners about overhanging hedges.

Grit Bins

Cllr Summers was thanked for repairing some of the grit bins. The clerk will order grit for the bins that need filling.

FOOTPATHS AND BRIDLEWAYS

Slow Ways - national walking network

The clerk had received comments from two of the Footpath Wardens but, after discussion, it was decided not to pursue further.

ENVIRONMENT/COMMUNITY FACILITIES

Beacon noticeboard and gate at Village Hall

Cllr Summers reported that he has repaired the noticeboard at Beacon and the gate has now been installed at the Village Hall.

Children's Christmas Party

It was agreed to donate £175 towards the costs of the children's Christmas party (proposed by Cllr Turner, seconded by Cllr Thorne).

Luppitt Packet

After discussion, it was agreed to reinstate the Parish Council's contribution of £160 to the Luppitt Packet (proposed by Cllr Tucker, seconded by Cllr Summers).

Quarterly check - internal financial controls

Cllr Ryder has checked and signed the cash book and reconciliation for the quarter ended September 2023 and has confirmed that everything is in order.

S137 Payments (donations) for 2024/25

The following S137 payments were agreed: TRIP £55.00; Royal British Legion £20.00; Devon Air Ambulance £100; Devon Freewheelers £100; British Heart Foundation £50.00.

The clerk reported that the East Devon Citizens Advice Bureau had again failed to bank the Parish Council's cheque. It was decided that no S137 payment would be made for the coming year (proposed by Cllr Tucker, seconded by Cllr Thorne).

Meeting Dates for 2024

It was agreed that the Parish Council would continue to meet on the first Tuesday of each month. The first meeting of the new year will be **Tuesday**, **2 January 2024**.

Code of Conduct

The clerk has compared the new Code of Conduct with the Parish Council's current version. It was agreed to continue to follow the existing Code of Conduct which has worked well in the past.

Secure Email System
