LUPPITT - PLANTING FOR BRITAIN

A few weeks ago the Parish Council was offered 200 mixed saplings free of charge. These tiny saplings include Oak, Sweet Cherry, Blackthorn and Hazel.

The trees are being provided by an Energy company to help offset their carbon footprint, and a condition of the scheme is that they must be planted in open access land.

Andrew Tucker cleared a small field below Hartridge, which he remembers from his childhood as grass, before it was taken over by bracken and scrub.

About 15 volunteers turned up on Thursday 17th November and Andrew organised a working party.

Firstly, stakes were hammered into the ground, and the saplings planted next to them.

Protective tubes were put over them







and clipped firmly to the stakes to protect them from squirrels, deer and birds.

Finally, squares of fibrous matting were pegged around the base of each tiny tree to keep weeds at bay.

200 trees were planted in 3 1/2 hours - Luppitt's contribution to help our planet.

MARION MACHELL'S TIME AS AN EVACUEE IN LUPPITT (PART TWO)

10th August 2012. I did the work on Luppitt in the first instance about 6 years ago am now incorporating it into family memories which one of my grandsons requested I undertake. (Five years ago, when he first went to Uni to gain his History degree and am still working at it!!!).

I first went to Honiton to a hotel with my parents, grandfather, and aunt (her neighbours were staying in a thatched cottage at the bottom of the hill). I believe their owner was Davis. However, as I could not stay there permanently my mother and I went to Dolish Farm and Mum eventually went into hospital again (am pleased to say she did live to be 80) and I stayed on".

Soar for some time and he sent her various photos which he thought would be of interest to her, including a photo of two little children which he found under a floorboard in Dolish Farmhouse.

I do not recognise the two girls in the photo. I wondered whether it might be

Peggy & Mary. I think in 1940 Mary was about 17/18, Ralph 16, & Peggy was 14.

Mary did a lot of farm work, and Peggy did a lot of household chores. I did ask Ralph and he said they both married farmers and one had four children and the other had children and one of them had a child with special needs. I believe Ralph is mentioned in the Home Guard photo- I saw it online – with the pub where they met.

Whilst staying on a farm outside Bridport we went to visit the Rosewells and one of the three girls had just had her A level results, and it transpired that the granddaughter of the Hutchins family at Broadoak, Bridport had been bridesmaid to one of them as they belonged to Young Farmers.

I was so impressed with the main staircase which looked so large to me, and I was on the right hand side of the house at the front and Mrs Wells had two rooms at the back on my side and the bathroom was there also. Not sure what the water situation was- no hot, I guess. Apologies if I have repeated all this but as it is now 72 years ago a few

senior moments occur. As you gather my maiden name was Farmer.

The lady friend of my aunt who rented the cottage for the holiday was Julia Catchpole but I don't think she remained long enough for her child to go to school".

Garden Jottings

Some years ago - quite a few really when I come to think about it - I wrote to Kirstenbosch and asked if they'd send me some seeds of Baines' Welwitschia. Welwitschia Bainesii is just about the weirdest plant there is, "the most bizarre of all gymnosperm" it looks like a giant turnip up to a metre of more across with a single pair of long leaves growing out of the top, bedraggled and dying off at their ends. There are never any more leaves no matter how long it lives and that can be over a hundred years. In those days I wanted to grow strange plants and this was certainly one.

However the Kirstenbosch would not send me any seeds. They said it was too endangered and protected. Welwitschia is a rare plant, confined to dry regions in South West Africa. Like stinging nettles there are male and female Welwitschias. Females produce seeds, and both grow organic that are somewhat like flowers. Like conifers, cycads and ephedras the seeds are not enclosed. The Welwitschia has features that resemble the Bennettitaleans, a group that looked like palm trees, widespread in Mesozoic forests before flowering plants crowded them out.

The only time I have seen a Welwitschia was at Kew. In my didactic days I organised a school trip there. The first pupil to find a Welwitschia got a £1, or was it 50p? Money value has changed so much since then I can't remember for sure.

The Kew specimen was disappointingly small, far from a metre across, but at least I'd seen one of the strangest plants.



From Reverend Penn's Pen

You must have heard it said - 'Christmas, it's for the kids, isn't it?' Yes, that's true. The magic and delight of Christmas is enjoyed by a child in a way impossible for an adult to experience. We did once. For myself, I can still recall my childhood Christmas experience — the sense of sheer, concentrated, magical bliss. Not much of it was to do with Jesus and the story of his birth, even though we were a church going family. It was more to do with Father Christmas, the prospect of a sack heaving with presents, family feasts and great films on TV.

Now, as an adult, I do not experience Christmas like this anymore. There is still magic, but the source of the magic has shifted from a portly, red-faced Christmas Eve visitor to the story of our Lord's birth. And this most definitely is a story for adults.

Think about it. This is an adult story if ever there was one. Mary conceives a child - a complicated and irregular teenage pregnancy. Her fiancé, very naturally, threatens her with divorce and social disgrace. Then they journey to Bethlehem because the over-bearing 'big-brother' State wants to count all of its citizen. At journey's end, in the full, bustling busy town of Bethlehem, there is no caring face to help out the young couple in need; the birth takes place in a stable, amidst squalor and mess. The Shepherds, dirty, despised workmen, shunned by the rest of society, are bizarrely given the news of Jesus' birth through a terrifying vision of angels. King Herod, fearing for his own throne and his hold on power, orders the slaughter of a whole generation of baby boys in the hope of 'eliminating' the baby Jesus. Mary, her young child, and Joseph are forced to flee to Egypt – they become, in effect, asylum seekers.

You see, this is a very modern, adult story, full of scandal, violence, shame, desperation and hardship. How, you might ask, can this very realistic and gritty story be a source of 'magical delight'? Because it tells us that this is how God works with us. If God was present once in scandal and shame and desperation, and found this a fitting way for his Son to be born, then we can be reassured that He will be present in the confusing mess of our own lives.

UKRAINE CONCERT SMASHES TARGET

When Roger Hicks and David Kalisch first conceived the idea of a concert to raise money for the Red Cross Ukraine Appeal, they had in mind a target of raising £3000. As ticket sales soared past the projected Hall capacity of 120, it looked like that target would be exceeded. And still the phone calls and emails came in, hoping for last minute tickets.

The Hall's Entertainments Committee rose to the challenge and on the night, over 140 people were seated in the beautifully decorated main Hall, creating a buzz of excitement and expectation as the 7pm 'curtains up' deadline approached. Behind the scenes the performers were making their last minute preparations, and at front of house the Virginia's Vintage Hire team began distributing shot glasses of Ukrainian Vodka preparation for the opening Toast to Ukraine. 'Slava Ukraini' was the call from the stage steps as David Kalisch raised his glass and proposed the 'Heroyam Slava!' responded toast. the audience, downing the ice cold vodka or 'horilka' as the Ukrainians call it

Ukrainian mezzo-soprano Iryna Ilnytska's opening performance of two poignant Ukrainian folk songs, beautifully delivered in her crystal clear voice, set the scene for a high quality first half of performances by our local artists, all of whom earned

enthusiastic applause from the audience.

The tempo changed dramatically at the start of the second half, as The Walnuts entered from the back of the hall, led by Fergus Muirhead, the sound of his bagpipes filling the room, with fellow band members following, clapping along to the rhythm of the music. Everyone in the audience joined in, clapping their hands, tapping their feet, and that's how it carried on through the whole of the second half. The Walnuts rocked the Hall with their music brilliantly played on pipes, fiddles, guitars and drums and the audience were out of their seats and dancing in the aisles.

So the initial target of £3000 went out of the window. We raised a staggering £5,800 for the Red Cross Ukraine Appeal, and the overall target now is £7000. 





Matters Arising

Constitution. This matter is on-going

<u>Treasurer's Report.</u> The Treasurer reported that it had been a good year with revenue comparable to 2019 (£12,000.00). The electricity bill came to £4251.00 and is likely to rise considerably, although the implication of the government's grant scheme is still unclear. Several expenses are afoot including new fire doors, the grass cutting bill, tarmac on the tennis court, & a projector screen.

Fund raising came to over £5000.00.

Adoption of the Accounts. The adoption of the accounts was proposed by Mr Bernard Clapp and seconded by Mrs Pat Bussey.

<u>Chairman's Report.</u> The Chairman reported that there had been good turnouts at most events, with successful Platinum Jubilee events and a well-attended Flower Show and Fete. Mrs Jean Hooper is retiring from the committee after many years as is Mrs Pat Bussey and he thanked them for all their work. He also thanked the Secretary for all her work.

<u>Entertainments Sub- Committee – Chairman's Report.</u> Thanks to an enthusiastic committee there were numerous fund-raising events during the year including a Quiz, Christmas Party, New Year's Eve Party, Sunday Stroll, Bingo, St Georges Day Event, Pub Games Night, Platinum Jubilee Picnic, Flower Show & Fete, and End of Summer Bash.

Minutes of previous meeting. The Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday, 4 October 2022, were unanimously agreed and signed as a correct record (proposed by Cllr Tucker and seconded by Cllr Summers).

Declaration of Interest. There were no declarations of interest.

PLANNING

Applications (for comment, support or objection)

22/1930/FUL – Ford Farm, Luppitt, EX14 4TR – Installation of 18-20 solar panels on removable mountings in adjacent field

This planning application has been withdrawn.

22/2234/UL – Mathayes, Luppitt, EX14 4SA – change of use from domestic Granny Annexe to holiday let accommodation adjacent existing dwelling house

This planning application was discussed in detail with reference to Luppitt's emerging Neighbourhood Plan. The Parish Council raises no objection to the change of use in this instance.

22/1690/FUL – Pound Cottage, Beacon, EX14 4TT – revised plans – existing garage to remain as existing.

Signage at Whippens

The Parish Council appreciates the action taken by the resident of Whippens to erect a sign to the glamping site via Spurtham Lane.

Decisions

22/1331/FUL – Primrose Cottage, Upottery, EX14 9QE – construction of single storey extension – approval.

The meeting was suspended to allow the member of public to speak on the next item.

Neighbourhood Plan

Luppitt's Neighbourhood Plan was approved and formally accepted at EDDC's Cabinet meeting on 5 October. EDDC has advised that the referendum date will be Thursday, 24 November 2022. An information sheet, signed by John Thorne, Parish Council Chair, and Roger Hicks, Steering Group Chair, has been sent to every property in the parish. It was recognised that it has been a long process to reach this point and it was important to encourage all residents to take the opportunity to vote. The referendum is organised by EDDC who will be sending voting information to every resident on the electoral roll.

The member of public would have preferred a referendum date in the new year and felt that the thrust of the Neighbourhood Plan was against farming. It was explained that EDDC organises the referendum and decides on the date of the referendum. The intention of the Neighbourhood Plan is to protect as much as possible the tranquillity and existing character of Luppitt. It will provide a useful document for the Parish Council to refer to when considering future planning applications. The member of public had prepared a list of questions for consultation but it was explained that the Neighbourhood Plan has been through rigorous examination by EDDC and an independent examiner and is now in its final form.

Open sessions will be held in the Village Hall on Wednesday, 9 November, between 7 and 9 pm and on Saturday, 19 November, between 10 am and 12 noon, when members of the public can attend to ask questions.

The meeting then resumed.

HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC

Parish Highways programme - update on Items to Report

It was agreed that there was little point in reporting potholes at the moment as there is so much water lying around. Items will continue to be reviewed at each Parish Council meeting. List will be attached to the Minutes.

The clerk of a neighbouring parish had written to see if local parishes would be interested in joining together for a meeting with Highways to discuss the standard of road repairs. The clerk had replied that Luppitt would be interested in attending such a meeting. Cllr Tucker understood from another local Parish Council that Highways are reducing the amount of work undertaken because of budget constraints.

Parish Maintenance

Grit Bins. Parish Councillors will pass on to the clerk details of any grit bin that needs filling so that she can advise Highways.

Sign by Ford Bridge. Cllr Tucker pointed out that there is a sign at Monkton indicating that the road from the main A30 towards Ford Bridge is unsuitable for HGV lorries. The clerk will speak to the resident who raised the matter.

FOOTPATHS AND BRIDLEWAYS

The clerk will contact Footpath Wardens to confirm that they are willing to continue monitoring the footpaths.

Waymarker Posts

The resident at Hillend is waiting for a new waymarker post. Cllr Tucker reported that a waymarker post was down on Footpath 14 below Penn. Cllr Tucker undertook to replace it with a new waymarker post.

ENVIRONMENT/COMMUNITY FACILITIES

Gate for Village Hall. The Locality budget has been reinstated so the clerk will apply again for funding towards the cost of a gate by the play area.

Sign for Play Area. The clerk handed over a sign for the play area to Cllr Summers who has undertaken to install it.

Defibrillator at Beacon. The defibrillator at Beacon needs a new battery. The clerk was given authorisation to pay the invoice when it arrives.

Telephone Kiosk scheme. Cllr Turner passed on further information. The cost of painting the kiosk is £127 plus VAT. The cost of replacing the door or a side panel would be £1,000 per repair. Cllr Turner believes it would be the Parish Council's responsibility if it were decided to move the kiosk from its current position but will confirm at the next meeting. There have been a number of successful transformations where kiosks have been adapted and used as a book lending place, to house a defibrillator, for a plant exchange, etc. Cllrs Pulman and Summers undertook to have a look at the condition of the kiosk to see whether there is any merit in pursuing this further.

Free Trees Project. Delivery is due on 3 November. One volunteer has offered to help Cllr Tucker with the planting. The clerk will put a message on the Luppitt What's App group.

It was agreed that the Parish Council would continue to meet on the first Tuesday of each month.

Parish Council Elections

The clerk advised that Parish Council elections take place every four years and these will be held in May 2023.

Correspondence

The internal auditor had written to thank the Parish Council for the voucher. An email giving details of the local library's facilities that may be used during the winter months to combat the cost of living crisis and rising energy costs was noted.

An email about Devon Community Resilience Forum was noted. The clerk advised that an Emergency Plan for Luppitt had been drawn up many years ago but had not been kept up to date. The clerk undertook to read through the current plan and report back at the next Parish Council meeting.

CHAIRMAN'S DISCRETION

Cllr Summers advised that there are ongoing discussions about providing Broadband in the Village Hall.

A resident had reported to the clerk that the sign to Otter Brewery is obscured with vegetation and a lorry had ended up taking a wrong turn. The clerk will follow up.

There were no further questions and the meeting closed at 9.30 pm.
