#### GARDEN JOTTINGS

"Have you got a long stake?"
Jacki was looking at our
camelia, "I'll see if I can find
one". The pink camelia's been
there ever since we came. It's
late this year and it's grown
very tall and thin. It'd do with a
good prune, I think. But there's
too little of it lower down. So a
stake will have to do.

Camelia's are acid lovers. They don't like being too dry either. So this spring must be suiting it. Anyway I'll water it with iron sulphate. Their soil should have a low pH value. Just what pH means I'm not certain? Something to do with hydrogen, I think. I must look it up on Mrs Street's tablet some time Rhododendrons and azaleas are the same. We have a blueberry bush too that produces lots of fruit. We've only just finished last year's kept in the freezer. They like acid conditions. And I've an idea gooseberries like a low pH site. I always water them with iron sulphate in the spring and they give a heavy crop.

Catkins has many shrubs and small trees apart from these acid lovers. Quite near the

blueberry there's a butternut. It's a small tree or tall shrub. Jacki grew it from a seed. At this time of the year it's covered with white flowers. I don't remember its technical name. maybe juglans. Another small tree with white flowers in May is a rowan. This one, still only small, must have grown from a seed dropped by a bird or squirrel. We certainly didn't plant it. One shrub we have several of that did come from seeds is a pheasant berry. Its purple berries are a rich bonus for birds especially blackbirds in late autumn. Its branches have a strange habit of dying off from the base with new shoots growing up. It is shrub which needs much pruning.

After what I feel has been a cold wet spring I see our dark blue bearded irises are announcing the arrival of more summery weather.

#### A Luppitt stroll

Rural Britain is a minefield of descriptive cliche's. Chalk downland is nearly always 'rolling'. Fenland is invariably 'pancake flat'. Moors, as a rule, are 'bleakly beautiful'.. As we look at our farmland, it can be hard to think of a better word than 'patchwork'.

Patchwork, perfectly describes the idyllic jigsaw of fields that sprouts to mind when many of us hear the word 'Countryside'. We don't live in an area where stone walls or ditches predominate! In most of the Luppitt area, we have Devon banks and hedgerows that are the living threads binding together the chequered greens, golds and ochres.

Many of us regularly amble alongside or through them, perhaps pausing to inhale a nose full of springtime blossom scent, or scoff juicy blackberries later in the year. I read somewhere that there was a survey carried out in Devon some time ago by a few ecologists who recorded an astonishing 2070 different species in a single 85 metre stretch of hedge. They are literally wildlife corridors.

It is before sunrise and I am ambling alongside the hedgerows heading for Hartridge for a short walk to the Hartridge monastery gardens and the secluded pond. I head down past the village hall, turning left, passing Meshayes ,Goulds and Hillend. It is the height of the breeding season, for our feathered friends, when all the paranoia of the last few months with getting territory and a mate, and then holding on to what you have gained, has at last dissipated with the chipping of the eggs in the nest. It's now far too late to worry about the parentage of your hatching chicks.

I eventually reach the woods near the Hartridge monastery . It is a very peaceful and tranquil place . Nature bathes our eyes in beautiful images every time we go for a walk-asking nothing of us but to open our eyes and see. I stroll through the silver birches overlooking the monastery area. The first notes ring through the darkness an hour before dawn. Robins, blackbirds and song thrushes often open the concert.. The dawn chorus reaches it's crescendo in the half hour either side of sunrise. The shadowy dawn is the safest time to carol loudly without being spied by predators and the acoustics are particularly good too. Sound can travel 20 times further in these still and quiet hours. To hear the wonder of the wild world however, your alarm will need to be set painfully early.

#### **Recipe Page**

#### **FREEZER BISCUITS**

200g plain flour

200g caster sugar

100g butter or soft margarine

1 tsp baking powder

1 egg

1/2 tsp salt

#### VARIATIONS

1) 1tsp ground ginger

50g crystallized ginger

2) 50g choc chips

1 tsp vanilla essence

3) 25g chopped dried apricots,

25g almond flakes

A few drops of almond essence

4) 25g dried cranberries

25g chopped macadamia nuts.

- · Mix together the egg, salt and sugar in a bowl.
- Add the sifted flour and baking powder, and the fat (butter may need melting)
- Add flavouring and mix to a soft dough.
- Roll into a long sausage 3cm in diameter and wrap in cling film. The dough can
  be frozen at this stage or cooled in the fridge before removing the film and
  cutting into 1cm slices.
- Place well apart on a baking tray and cook for 15-20 mins at 160 degrees Fan or Gas Mark 4.

You can invent your own flavourings using instant coffee or grated lemon or chopped raisins ......

#### ANSWERS TO A LITTLE LOCAL HISTORY QUIZ. PART TWO.

- Honiton Union Workhouse was on the site of the present Honiton Hospital buildings and carpark. It was still a workhouse on the 1903 O.S. map.
- 14. Sir John Simcoe, first Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada, (1752 1806). Upper Canada became Ontario. Toronto was at first called York. In Iroquois, Toronto means something like 'where there are trees in the water', i.e. a fish weir.
- 15. Simcoe is buried in Wolford chapel which is on the estate bought by him and his wife when they returned to England. The chapel flies the flag of Canada as it is official Canadian territory. The estate remained in the family until the 1920s.
- 16. Jack Rattenbury was a famous 19<sup>th</sup> century smuggler from Beer. With a local clergyman he wrote his memoirs, which are still in print.
- 17. The site was part of Honiton station goods yard (which included cattle pens) and an adjacent timber yard. This timber yard belonged to George Blay.a
- 18. It was powered by atmospheric pressure, not a vacuum. Pumping stations evacuated air from a pipe between the rails; air pressure propelled a piston to which were attached carriages. The system failed because the pipe could not be sealed adequately with a leather flap. The pumping station at Starcross still stands.
- 19. The Vickers Viscount aircraft crash landed in fields near Ottery St Mary, in July 1980. All fuel tanks were empty and the aircraft was damaged beyond repair. There were no casualties.
- 20. The Shambles were built of timber and thatch in 1673, in the widest part of High Street. 'Shambles' is an old word for an open-air slaughterhouse and meat market, with all its accompanying squalor and unpleasantness. Honiton Shambles were demolished in 1823.
- 21. Barbary pirates (in fast ships with oars and sails) raided the coasts of S.W. England, Brittany and Ireland. It is estimated that 40,000Christians were sold in Algiers, Tunis etc in the first half of the 17<sup>th</sup> century. This trade finally ceased with the French conquest of Algeria in 1830, although Britain and European countries had made many attempts to stop it before this.
- 22. Honiton is first recorded as a cloth town in 1244. The woollen industry was flourishing in the 17<sup>th</sup> & 18<sup>th</sup> centuries but then declined rapidly.

- 23. Black Lion was a pub at the bottom of New Street, which was demolished to widen the road. J says she remembers traffic lights there, but I don't.
- 24. Yes, I'm afraid so. They also had socks, capes and scarves. Letters asking for or sending such items have been found at Vindolanda on Hadrian's Wall.

#### Story of Tapswater.

#### Found in the Luppitt Book

Ever since I launched a story about Luppitt Harbour and the bloaters which were caught in the sea there, I have been inundated with fishy stories about Luppitt - most of them red herrings. But now from my old friend Bill Tucker I have the true Luppitt story as passed on to him by his father sixty odd years ago. Apparently, there was a glut of mackerel at Beer and Branscombe and a Luppitt chap set off with a pony and trap to bring back a load. He stopped at hostelries on the way back and perhaps he was not in full control of the pony by the time he arrived back in the village. At any rate, as he was passing the river before it was piped the pony was startled by the reflection of the moon on the water. The pony reared up and tipped all the fish into the river. It was then that the locals began catching mackerel in Luppitt sea. Well, that's Mr Tuckers story and he reckons its the most feasible he's heard. He knows that the story was told to his father by a sixty year old man and he thinks the events he described probably took place 150 years ago.

#### Out and about

The East Devon catchment has a varied landscape and stretches from Exmoor and the Blackdown Hills in the north to Exmouth and the Jurassic coast and west Dorset.

At approximately 750 sq.km, the East Devon catchment drains the rivers Exe, Otter, Sid, Axe and Lim.

Only 7% of the catchment is developed, compared to the national average of 16%. East Devon is predominantly agricultural, with lowland cattle and sheep farms constituting 38% of the farming practice. The population of the catchment includes the main urban areas of Exeter, Crediton, Tiverton and Cullompton. Exeter, the county town of Devon, has a population of 119,600.

The catchment contains one National Park and three Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONBs) covering 66% of the catchment.

East Devon's varied landscape provides ecologically important habitat, with:

- 4 Special Areas of Conservation (SACs)
- 1 Special Protected Area (SPA)
- 1 National Nature Reserve (NNR) and
- 29 Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSIs).

There are 103 river water bodies in the catchment as well as 4 lakes, 4 estuaries, 10 groundwater bodies and coastal waters to the south.

There are areas in the catchment where the benefits of the water environment is recognised and are designated as protected areas. These areas can be designated as protected for several reasons, whether they are important habitats, bathing waters or areas around drinking sources.

# Clerk's report of the Annual General Meeting of Luppitt Parish Council held at Luppitt Village Hall on Wednesday, 10 May 2023, at 8 pm

**Present:** Cllrs John Thorne, Brian Pulman, Martin Summers, Andrew Tucker, Colin Brown (EDDC) and Rosalind Buxton (clerk)

#### Receive apologies for absence

Apologies were received from Cllrs Michele Turner, Christine Ryder, Yehudi Levine (EDDC) and Iain Chubb (DCC)

# Appointment of Chair, Vice-Chair, Planning Committee, Parish Maintenance Committee, Tree Warden, Snow Warden and P3 Co-Ordinator

Cllr Pulman took the chair for the election of Parish Council Chair and Vice-Chair. After discussion, Cllr Tucker proposed Cllr Turner as Chair and this was seconded by Cllr Pulman with all in favour. Cllr Tucker then proposed Cllr Thorne as Vice-Chair and this was seconded by Cllr Pulman with all in favour. Cllr Thorne then took the chair in Cllr Turner's absence.

It was agreed unanimously that the whole council would be members of the Planning Committee (with a quorum of three) and that the whole council (excluding Cllr Tucker) would be members of the Parish Maintenance Committee (with a quorum of two). It was agreed unanimously that Cllr Pulman would act as co-ordinator of the Parish Maintenance Committee, that Cllr Tucker would continue as Tree Warden and Cllr Pulman would continue as snow warden (proposed by Cllr Thorne, seconded by Cllr Summers). The clerk will continue to act as point of contact with the three footpath wardens for the P3 scheme.

#### Receive the Chair's Declaration of Acceptance of Office

The clerk will arrange for Cllr Turner to sign her form as soon as convenient.

#### Receive the Vice-Chair's Declaration of Acceptance of Office

Cllr Thorne signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office of Vice-Chair. Cllr Thorne said he had enjoyed his tenure as Parish Council Chair over the past 9 years and would continue to work hard for the Parish Council. He thanked all the Parish Councillors for their support and congratulated Cllr Turner on her appointment as Chair. The Parish Council was very grateful to Cllr Thorne for his hard work over the years.

#### Receive the Acceptance of Office from Parish Councillors

All councillors, apart from Cllr Prettejohn, have signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office of Councillor. The clerk will arrange for Cllr Prettejohn to sign the form as soon as convenient.

#### **Co-option procedure for Parish Councillor vacancy**

Three residents had applied to be considered to fill the vacancy on the Parish Council. The clerk read out statements from the applicants and voting was by secret ballot. Charles Murray was the successful applicant. The clerk will write

to the unsuccessful candidates to thank them for their interest.

#### Receive apologies for absence

Apologies were received as above.

#### Minutes of previous meeting

The Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday, 4 April 2023, were unanimously agreed and signed as a correct record of that meeting (proposed by Cllr Pulman and seconded by Cllr Summers).

#### **Declaration of Interest**

Cllr Tucker declared an interest in the planning application at Mohuns Ottery because he carries out work there.

#### **PLANNING**

# 23/0639/FUL – Spurtham Farm, New Road, Upottery, EX14 9QD – proposed alteration to building operations to facilitate the use of the building as an office

Change of use from a redundant pig unit to office space under permitted development rights has already been granted (22/2167/PDR). The Parish Council felt that this was a sizeable development and had concerns about the extra traffic that this might generate. The comments were submitted to EDDC.

### 23/0816/FUL – Pulshays, Combe Raleigh, EX14 4UJ – installation of 18 ground mounted solar panels on 3 frames of 6 panels

With reference to Luppitt's Neighbourhood Plan (policy CC2 – Renewable Energy Schemes), the Parish Council would prefer solar panels to be installed on domestic or agricultural buildings. However, if this is not possible, the Parish Council will support field-based domestic scale solar panels where they are well-screened, non-reflective and do not adversely impact on the landscape or neighbouring properties. The Parish Council has no objection to this planning application.

### 23/0928/FUL – Mohuns Ottery, Luppitt, EX14 4TS – livestock and general-purpose agricultural building with removal of hedgerow section

The Parish Council is keen to support traditional farming but there was concern at the location and size of the building, although it was appreciated that it would be housing 130 cattle. The clerk will send relevant extracts from the Neighbourhood Plan for the Parish Councillors to consider before submitting comments to EDDC.

#### **Higher Wick**

The Enforcement Officer has advised that he is still waiting for a Change of Use application for the metal fabrication business at Higher Wick. The Enforcement Officer is waiting for a noise report from the agent.

#### **Housing Needs Survey**

The clerk had contacted Devon Communities Together about a Housing Needs Survey. When the Parish Council first made enquiries about this, the cost was going to be £300. However, Government funding for this has now been withdrawn and the cost will be in the region of £2,500. The clerk will make

enquiries to see if any other funding is available.

The efforts of Cllrs Pulman, Summers and Tucker had contributed to the success of the event. Cllr Thorne was thanked for all his hard work before and during the day.

#### **Free Trees Project**

The clerk has forwarded photographs of the newly planted trees as requested.

#### FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

#### Quarterly check - internal financial controls

Cllr Ryder has checked and signed the cash book and reconciliation for the quarter ended March 2023 and confirmed that everything is in order.

#### **Annual Accounts**

The year-end figures were agreed by the Parish Council without any queries. Papers have been sent to the internal auditor who was satisfied that the financial systems and controls had been properly carried out and that the final bank reconciliation accurately reflected the year-end balance held in Luppitt Parish Council's bank account. The Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR) will be presented for approval to the Parish Council at next month's meeting. The year-end bank reconciliation has been signed by Cllrs Thorne and Ryder.
