PROPOSED 'LANDSCAPE RECOVERY' BID FOR LUPPITT PARISH

Following a series of public meetings over the summer, a bid is going to be submitted to Defra this autumn under the 'Landscape Recovery' programme, to seek long term investment in the Luppitt valley in sustainable farming and nature conservation.

The parish of Luppitt is unique in the Blackdown Hills for the size of the SSSI at its core, and the extent of common land it holds. It has also benefitted from a high level of collective community activity in recent years, including the creation of the Neighbourhood Plan in 2022. The Landscape Recovery bid will seek to build on these qualities to provide a series of long-term benefits for biodiversity, soil carbon, water quality and flood resilience, in harmony with sustainable farming. The bid will focus on:

- Investing in making Hense Moor even richer in wildlife
- Improving habitats for wildlife on the wider Commons
- Restoring marshy habitat on some of the poorer land on moist slopes around the springline
- Improving soil health, carbon storage and rainfall infiltration on the plateau land
- Protecting ditches, streams and the river on the lower valley land
- Creating opportunities for training and educational activity for local people to learn about sustainable farming.

Landscape Recovery is a competitive scheme and the Luppitt proposal will face stiff competition, but if the bid is successful, it will release funding for a development period of up to 2 years from early 2024. This will enable participating farmers to receive free, tailored business and environmental advice, helping them negotiate agricultural transition and plan for the future.

Some 25 landowners in the parish, with land totalling over 1800 acres, have so far expressed interest in joining the bid, and other landowners are invited to sign up before the deadline for submitting the bid on 21st September.

By signing up, landowners are not committing to any works or activities on their land at this stage. There will be no commitment needed until near the end of the development period, when long-term management agreements of up to 20 years can be entered into. Funding will come from Defra for the development stage, plus 'green investment' sources for the subsequent long-term agreements.

The bid is being drafted by a group on behalf of the wider parish, comprising David Barlow, Gavin Brake, David Crabb, Roger Hicks, Louisiana Lush (chair), Fred Sage and Greg Page-Turner, advised and supported by Gavin Saunders from the Blackdown Hills AONB, and George Greenshields.

A Luppitt Stroll

I was chatting to a lady at an event in Exeter the other day. She is a well renowned wildlife and nature photographer, and she mentioned Luppitt, and particularly a planned mini break or weekend to Devon. Hopefully a visit to Dumpdon hill to capture images of Butterflies.

I thought to myself 'a weekend' two days. What can you do in 48 hours? That we have allowed the word 'mini break' into our language reflects the lamentable sizeism which effects so many aspects of our judgement. If two days away is a mini break what was the day you got married -a micro experience?

However, many of my experiences and enduring memories strolling around Luppitt have been formed from the smallest units of time. Small things can be just as transporting-portals to a better appreciation of what really matters. The virtuosity of birdsong, the rhythm of your footsteps on good ground, the peaceable company of our fellow creatures in the lanes and fields around our homes.


I decided to take a wander up and around Dumpdon Hill to investigate the butterflies. Sure enough on the slopes facing towards Greenway manor and Little Shelvin I was surrounded by a Kaleidoscope, a wing, a flight, a flutter, a rabble, what ever collective noun you choose, they were there..

Butterflies flitting by are a joyful site on a walk. And they're not only beautiful, they're extraordinary. Painted ladies migrate thousands of miles. Wall browns release a scent like chocolate cream, while greenveined whites trail a zesty lemon fragrance. I have been told of the large blue, who is a master con artist. After feeding on flowers of wild thyme, a larva will drop to the ground and sweetly secrete drops of honeydew to attract passing red ants. It then mimics the sound of a queen ant, encouraging the worker to carry it back to the nest-where it tucks into so many grubs it fattens itself to 100 times its original size.

Following my short but memorable Butterfly experience on Dumpdon, I head home via Palmerhayes and Rolleshayes.

The bird breading season just passed has been like an explosion, way back in spring the fuse of reproduction was lit. The 'bomb' went off and dozens of small birds burst first from the nest and then from their parents' territory. In August this feathered debris sailed around our neighbourhood and now at last in September, some at least has floated to the ground and settled in a new place.

August might be a month to yawn and doze, but September ushers in the autumn with a little more urgency. The wild fruit is still heavy and succulent upon the berry-bearing trees and there are still bees and flies aplenty. But the occasional sharper night whisks away the heavier air. Mornings are often misty, and dampness begins to pervade the soil. September has a gentle but persuasive way of introducing harder times.

GARDEN JOTTINGS

September may be getting rather late in the year, but its garden borders are still alive with summer bedding. September is often the zenith of dahlia display. Some years ago I spent several autumn months in North Yorkshire, not the warmest part of the country. I remember the unexpected brilliance of a carefully tended dahlia display there. Early autumn was warm and sunny, yet snow and ice had descended on the area before I had got to the balmy warmth of the south east.

In September there is a strong accent on yellow in the border. There is golden rod, Rudbeckia, Heleniums, Helianthemum. Strong growing favourites like Michaelmas daisies, Japanese anemones and silvery Pampas grass contrast with this yellow theme. There are plenty of other late border plants flowering at this time – Valerian, Scabious, Echinacea, Sedum, Schizostylis. The chrysanthemum season will soon be upon us.

September is the time to start thinking about setting out spring bulbs – daffodils, hyacinths, fritillaries, crocuses. There some less usual flowering autumn bulbs – autumn crocuses and autumn snowdrops. A few years ago I remember seeing an unusual

display in a public park in Exmouth of the yellow autumn flowering Sternbergia.

Jackie was watching a hare in a field the other morning. Hares are native. They live above ground, while rabbits supposed to have been introduced by the Normans, live in burrows.

MICHAELMAS

Michaelmas is celebrated on the 29th September and is also known as the Feast of Saints Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael, the Feast of Archangels, or the Feast of Saint Michael and All Angels.

St Michael is considered by many to be the most important of all the angels as he hurled the devil down from Heaven for his treachery. He is the patron saint of the sea and maritime lands, of ships and boatmen, of horses and horsemen.

Harvest Festivals are held at this time of year as a thanksgiving for the fruits of the earth.

Michaelmas is one of the four quarter days of the English and Irish financial, judicial, and academic year. It marks the first term of the academic year.

Michaelmas also marks the half yearly rent day for farmers, chosen in ancient times as the harvest would be complete. A reeve (Saxon) or bailiff (Norman) would collect the rents. Many farmers still attend a rent day on larger estates. Sometimes a tenant would take a goose as a gift for the landlord if he was unable to pay his rent and this is one reason why goose is traditionally eaten at Michaelmas. Another is that geese are particularly tasty at this time of year, and Queen Elizabeth I was said to be eating goose in 1588 when she received news that the royal navy had defeated the Spanish Armada.

Michaelmas Day is sometimes called Goose Day. The famous Nottingham Goose Fair is held just after Michaelmas; it's still a great fair but no longer sells geese. It was one of many 'Mop Fairs' where labourers sought work, laying out their tools and offering themselves for hire for the coming year.

Superstition surrounds the eating of goose at Michaelmas.

'If the breast bones of the goose are brown after roasting the following winter should be mild, but if the bones are white or have a slight blue then winter will be severe.'

It was thought that if you ate a goose at Michaelmas, you would have good luck for the rest of the year. The festival was celebrated with more enthusiasm in Ireland and if you found a ring hidden in the Michaelmas pie you would soon be married.

Michaelmas used to be a popular day for the winter curfew to begin; this took the part of a tolling of the church bell, usually one strike for each of the day of the month that had passed in the current year and rung at 9pm. The word curfew may derive from the French word couvre feu, meaning cover fire. The bell was a warning to douse the fires and was tolled every night except Sunday until Shrove Tuesday. A similar tradition continues in Chertsey.

Folklore has it that blackberries should not be picked after Michaelmas as when the devil was kicked out of heaven on that feast day, he landed on a bramble bush and cursed the fruit, scorching them with his fiery breath, stamping and spitting on them and generally making them unfit for human consumption.

Other sayings include:

'If St Michael brings many acorns, Christmas will cover the fields with snow.'

'A dark Michaelmas, a light Christmas.'

'Tis a dangerous time of year! Look out for acorns, dodgy geese and don't touch blackberries after the 29th!

The Michaelmas Daisies, among dede weeds,
Bloom for St Michael's valorous deeds,
And seems the last flowers that stood,
Till the feast of St Simon and St Jude.

Hense Moor SSSI Update

The Environment Agency, Westcountry Rivers Trust and Wood Group UK are working with the Luppitt Commoners on a research project to understand the impact of different land use types on water resources. The area of Hense Moor SSSI below Overday Farm has been chosen as one of three pilot catchments that will be subject to detailed monitoring of flow, groundwater levels, soil moisture and rainfall.

After a delay in starting this project due to Covid, the monitoring equipment was installed in early 2023, beginning a two-year period of data collection scheduled to finish at the end of March 2025. There is a flow control beam across the stream at the bottom of this valley, which measures the variable flow levels in this tributary. Two sites in this Hense Moor valley have shallow boreholes and rainfall/weather monitoring equipment. You may have noticed them while walking on the Hense Moor over the summer (they are fenced off from livestock with untreated posts and rails). All these sites, plus a few additional ones on surrounding private land, have telemetry units sending data over the mobile phone/data network.

This study forms part of the wider Otter Land Use and Water Resources Project which focuses on assessing the benefits of woodland in the Upper Otter catchment in preserving precious water resources. Woodland has been shown to reduce surface run-off which can lead to water pollution, and create water infiltration pathways to reduce peak river flows. The monitoring aspect of this project will gather data on groundwater level. surface flows, rainfall, soil moisture, weather and water quality data to understand and compare how water behaves and is influenced in catchments with differing land uses.

The data, which is being collected and analysed by the Westcountry Rivers Trust, will be used to build a "decision making tool" which models different distributions of woodland to better understand the effects of tree planting. Currently, the groundwater bodies in the Lower Otter catchment suffer from over abstraction and nitrate pollution. The findings of this work will help the Environment Agency to meet the regulatory objectives for improving water resources in the Otter catchment to reach Good status under the Water Framework Directive.

All works and required permissions were obtained in advance from Natural England under Section 28E(1)(a) of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 (as amended and inserted by section 75 and Schedule 9 of the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000).

When the project finishes, I have asked that the key conclusions are published in The Packet.

2023 Flu vaccinations for those registered with the Blackdown practice

The Blackdown Practice will be offering Flu vaccinations in line with NHS quidance to:

- patients aged 65 years and over
- patients aged under 65 years in defined clinical risk groups
- patients aged 2 & 3 years old on 31st August 2023
- patients who are residents in care homes
- patients who are carers
- close contacts of immunocompromised individuals
- pregnant women

We will have plenty of Flu Vaccines available and will be able to arrange appointments for all of our patients who are eligible.

Our booking process will open during the 1st week of September, and we expect to start vaccinating from early October. We will hold vaccination sessions across all three of our surgeries.

Bookings will be a combination of direct mobile text message booking, online booking, and by telephoning the surgery flu line number.

Further details of the booking process will be made available towards the end of August via The Blackdown Practice website and via text messaging – if you are not currently signed up to receive text messages but would like to do so please let us know.





Clerk's report of a Meeting of Luppitt Parish Council held at Luppitt Village Hall on Tuesday, 4 July 2023, at 8 pm

Present: Cllrs Michele Turner (Chair), Charles Murray, Paul Prettejohn, Brian Pulman, Martin Summers and Andrew Tucker

Receive apologies for absence

Apologies were received from Cllrs John Thorne, Christine Ryder, Colin Brown and Yehudi Levine (EDDC).

Minutes of previous meeting

The Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday, 6 June 2023, were unanimously agreed and signed as a correct record of that meeting (proposed by Cllr Summers and seconded by Cllr Tucker).

Declaration of Interest

There were no declarations of interest.

EDDC webinar on Local Plan

Cllr Turner and Roger Hicks had attended the webinar. Cllr Turner explained that the purpose of the webinar was to provide an update on EDDC's emerging Local Plan (2020-2040) and to explain how EDDC will determine housing numbers in the future. Approximately 900-1,000 new houses per year over the 20-year period are envisaged. AONBs cover 65% of the East Devon district and are, therefore, considered to be a constraint to development. Grade 1, 2 and 3a of agricultural land (Luppitt is mainly Grade 3 or 4) will be protected to some degree although new Government guidance indicates that no part of the district is off limits for housing. There are 40 new Designated Neighbourhood Areas and Luppitt is listed as one of them. Major growth will take place on the western side of the district around Exeter; significant development will take place at Exmouth, Axminster, Honiton, Ottery St Mary, Seaton and Sidmouth; support development will take place at Broadclyst, Budleigh Salterton. Colyton, Lympstone and Woodbury. A long list has been drawn up of villages (excluding Luppitt and Upottery but including Dunkeswell) that have been identified for limited development for local needs. Settlements not included in this list are considered to be **open countryside** where more restrictive planning policies still apply and Luppitt falls into this category.

Fabrication business at Higher Wick

The clerk read out an email from a member of the family at Higher Wick explaining that they have been told by their agent that there is no requirement for a Change of Use application because steel fabrication has been carried out at Higher Wick for more than 15 years. Cllr Brown was not at the meeting but the clerk will ask him to follow up with EDDC and establish some clarity.

REPORTS

No reports received from Ward and County Councillors.

HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC

Parish Highways programme - update on Items to Report as follows:

Potholes between Pennythorne Cross and Little Shelvin – clerk will report.

Parish Maintenance

The two refrigerators that had been dumped have been removed.

Damage to road at Higher Wick

Cllrs Pulman and Tucker had visited the site. They did not feel that any action was necessary at this stage but will keep the situation under review.

FOOTPATHS AND BRIDLEWAYS

Nothing to report.

ENVIRONMENT/COMMUNITY FACILITIES

Meeting between the Police and Parish Councils

Cllr Turner had attended a meeting arranged by the police and held in Dunkeswell. It was chaired by the Sector Inspector. There were 13 attendees including Cllrs Brown and Chubb. Our area of East Devon is considered to be a safe area. There are some speeding offences and some instances of drug misuse. There has been a spate of thefts of catalytic converters. There has also been some antisocial behaviour perpetrated by young people in Honiton and Axminster areas with instances of violence towards a person being filmed and put on Tik Tok. The police are treating this very seriously and are clamping down on this. The A3052 is classed as a high harm route and this is monitored closely. There are plans to open the front office of the Honiton Police Station. The aim of the meetings is to improve communications. The next meeting will be held in Seaton on Thursday, 19 October, at 11 am.

Free Trees Project

The organiser of the Free Trees Project had emailed the clerk to request more photographs. The clerk was asked to reply saying that there was not much appreciable difference to the photographs already sent. Cllr Tucker advised that some maintenance of the ground is needed. Cllr Prettejohn said he was prepared to lend a rough-cut mower and Cllrs Summers and Pulman undertook to help Cllr Tucker.

Play Area Bench

After discussion, it was agreed not to add the new bench as a separate item on the insurance policy.

Beacon Noticeboard

The clerk and Cllr Turner will research quotes for a new noticeboard at Beacon. Cllr Summers also undertook to look at the noticeboard when he is passing.

80th Anniversary Event of D-Day on 6 June 2024

It was agreed to take part in the 80th anniversary of D-Day on 6 June 2024, following the format of the events organised by the Parish Council for the Platinum Jubilee in 2022 and the Coronation of King Charles earlier this year.

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION External Audit

The clerk confirmed that the Annual Governance and Accounting Return has been submitted to the external auditors and the Notice of Public Rights has been displayed on the Village Hall noticeboard and the website.

Voucher for Internal Auditor

It was agreed that the clerk should purchase a voucher to the value of £50.00 to give to the internal auditor.

Councillor Training

The clerk gave details of training offered by the Devon Association of Local Councils for Parish Councillors.

Councillor Photographs

A discussion followed the suggestion by the clerk of putting photographs of individual councillors on the website, together with a short descriptive account of each councillor. There was not unanimous agreement over this but Cllr Turner and the clerk will upload their profiles in the hope of demonstrating that it is not too daunting a prospect.
