GARDEN JOTTINGS

It's getting light early now. The first glimmer of brightness and the birds



start their song. Blackbirds round us are really quite noisy, and throughout the day too, and in the evening. A beautiful sound that makes you glad to be alive, very different from mechanical noise. Really I imagine in their avian language they're saying "This space is mine. It's mine. You get lost." I sometimes wonder if early

people didn't get the idea of music and song from birds.

Of course there are many other birds joining in. As I wasn't brought up in a rural environment I don't recognise their special song. There are various tits and finches, crows, redcrests, woodpeckers, robins, thrushes and others. Pigeons lumber about just over your head cooing and chattering. Henry pheasant and his wives are often about helping themselves to food. In the summer high up in the sky a solitary buzzard often wails plaintively, perhaps recently hatched but now left to feed itself. The largest bird we ever had was a gaudy peacock strutting about before breakfast time.

Last month I mentioned yellow arums. This is Arum creticum from Turkey and the Greek islands. If it has a more ordinary name I don't

know it. I first came across this arum in the seventies from the Sherbourne nursery of Jim Archibald and Eric Smith. Jim Archibald moved to Wales and concentrated on collecting and selling unusual seeds before he passed away five or so years ago from a brain tumour. Arum creticum grows green leaves in late winter. It has large rather twisted spathes with a long protruding pedicle. The strain I have is from Cotswold nursery. It has now grown for



several years in an exposed spot with no frost protection. Arum creticum is an unusual and noticeable plant.

(Apologies to Dylan Thomas and his mythical village of Llareggub)

Morning breaks on Tuppill, cradled in the hills of East Devon, where the River Lurve ambles as lazily as the villagers' gossip. The air smells faintly of damp grass, cow manure, and a hint of something witchy—though the last real spell was cast when Granny Hobbs cursed the milkman's float to reverse uphill during Lent, 1923.



On the high ridge, Farmer Pritchard's cows plot their great escape. Below, at Luppitt Harbour (a glorified bend in the river), Mrs. Tallmadge recalls the day the fish lorry toppled its load, turning the river into a writhing, silver soup. She still swears the trout sang hymns as they drifted by.

In the heart of the village, the incomers awaken. Mrs. Drabble-Smythe, a formidable retired schoolmistress, sips her organic nettle tea while drafting an indignant email to the Parish Council about the "overly exuberant carol service." Mr. Pennington, her neighbour and a tech consultant who insists he's "semi-retired," wrestles with his Wi-Fi, which has been cursed to vanish every Tuesday since he accidentally mowed down the village witch's parsley.

The coffee morning begins at the Village Hall. Mrs. Codd serves the tea, her blue rinse bobbing rhythmically as she judges everyone in attendance. The chatter is as thick as clotted cream.

"Did you hear? Farmer Pritchard's cows got into Mrs. Winthrop's garden and crushed her dahlias," whispers Mrs. Dewberry.

"Ruined her leeks too," adds Mr. Dunn with a satisfied smirk, for he's been envious of her blue-ribbon-winning produce since 1956.

Meanwhile, on the outskirts, Farmer Pritchard retrieves his renegade herd with language unfit for the hymnbook. Mrs. Winthrop surveys her wrecked vegetable patch and loudly proclaims she shall now "buy from Tesco." Her daughter, having heard this threat for the 20th time this year, pretends to faint with horror.



In the afternoon, the village quiets. Sheep bleat softly in the distance. Retirees take their constitutionals and wave to Mrs Clasp, whose goats - known for their escapee prowess - are grazing in a hedge, eyeing the graveyard for new terrain. The goats' most daring act remains their occupation of the pub's snug one boozy evening last spring.

Evening falls. Tuppill nestles under a star-studded quilt. The River Lurve glistens like a sly smile, carrying with it centuries of secrets, spells, and spilled tea. If you listen closely, you might hear the witches' laughter in the rustle of the trees or in the baa of the goats plotting their next heist.

As the village drifts to sleep, the ghosts of fish, witches, and mischiefmakers past mingle in the mist, keeping Tuppill forever peculiar, forever enchanting.

CREAM TEA ANYONE!

Did you know that Cream Teas are a global phenomenon, but where did they originate?

There are those who claim it was in Cornwall where there were so many Channel Island cows, but of course those of us who live in Devon know this can't be true, as the first documented evidence was discovered by historians studying ancient manuscripts as part of the research leading up to the 900th anniversary of the granting of Tavistock's Royal Charter by King Henry 1 in 1105. After piecing parts of manuscripts together they discovered that Benedictine monks could have created the dish to feed workers who were restoring the Abbey after it had been plundered by the Vikings in 997 AD. The restoration work was undertaken by Ordulf, Earl of



Devon and the monks gave his workers bread, clotted cream, and strawberry preserves.

Cream Teas became popular in Victorian times after the railways made the West Country much more accessible.

Then there is the problem of how you assemble the scones. In Cornwall, the split scone is covered in strawberry jam and topped with clotted cream, whilst in

Devon its cream first with strawberry jam on the top.

In March 2018, the Cornish National Trust at Lanhydrock House caused a social media backlash by advertising a Mother's Day Tea at the property on Facebook with a photo of a cream tea made the Devon way! After a number of mainly humorous comments the Trust corrected the error stating that the member of staff responsible for the mistake had been 'reprimanded and marched back across the Tamar.'

I must say I often assess the ingredients first before deciding as both can be runny and difficult to put on a scone. Heretic I hear you say! But this is probably why a lot of Tearooms serve the jam and cream in separate dishes.

I once went on a trip to view a series of lovely gardens in a Somerset village, which culminated in a cream tea. Unfortunately, the organisers had decided to use cream from aerosols to create a piped effect on the scones. It was a sweltering day, and the aerosols would not work. When the tea eventually arrived there was no jam on the swirl of cream only a strawberry – now that was never right!

A Long Road Home:

The History of Gypsies and Travellers in the Blackdown Hills (As part of the June Gypsy, Roma and Traveller History Month)

For centuries, the hills and lanes of Devon — including our own Blackdown Hills — have been thoroughfares for a wide range of nomadic people, including Romany Gypsies, Irish Travellers, and New Travellers. These communities, though often misunderstood, are woven deeply into the history of rural life in the West Country.

Historically, Romany Gypsies and Irish Travellers moved through

Devon with the seasons, doing essential work on farms: hedging, ditching, fruit picking, horse trading, tin-smithing, charcoal burning, knife sharpening and peg making. Many local families would have relied on them at one time or another. Some even settled here in the hills, contributing to the same rural culture we now celebrate. Their lifestyle - lowimpact, seasonal, land-based is actually something we now describe with words like "sustainable" and "resilient." They used horses for transport long before it was trendy to talk about carbon emissions



Romany Gypsies arrived in England over 500 years ago, with records dating back to the early 1500s. Many settled in the South West, drawn by the gentle climate and the seasonal work offered by farming communities. Their knowledge of horses, traditional crafts, music, and storytelling enriched rural life — and continues to do so.

Irish Travellers, a distinct group with their own language and customs, also have a long history in the UK. Many passed through or settled in Devon, especially in the 19th and 20th centuries, working in agriculture, construction, and scrap metal recycling. Other traveller groups include travelling showmen and barge dwellers.

In more recent decades, the New Traveller movement emerged and has grown considerably — often people choosing a more mobile, off-grid lifestyle. Some were born into traditional travelling families, while

others were drawn by environmental values or a desire for freedom and simplicity. In recent years, especially due to spiralling rents and the lack of afordable housing, the movement has broadened to include so-called "vanlifers" — a diverse group that includes younger adventurers as well as retirees and older people seeking a more flexible or affordable way of life, often travelling in converted vans or motorhomes.

Sadly the history of Romany gypsies includes periods of intense discrimination and persecution — 250,000 European Romany people were killed during the Holocaust and a further 2,500 were forcibly sterilised and experimented on, a fact that is still too often overlooked. Even today, Travelling communities face increased challenges and ongoing public misunderstanding.

Today the majority of Local Authorities in the UK still fail to fulfil their statutory obligation to provide sufficient authorised permanent sites with amenities for Travellers, and 92% fail to provide any transit pitches at all. Traditional rural stopping places, or 'atchen tan', have been increasingly blocked, often through the use of boulders, ditches and other barriers, leading to a shortage of stopping locations, and prejudice against Travellers has been called "the last bastion of acceptable racism in this country" by the Commission for Racial Equality.

As part of Devon's rural history, Gypsies and Travellers have lived, worked, and moved through these landscapes for generations. Understanding their past helps shed light on a longstanding way of life that has shaped the countryside we know today — and perhaps, in doing so, could encourage a little more understanding along the way.

Receive apologies for absence

Apologies were received from Cllrs Lindsay Hill, Colin Brown and Yehudi Levine (EDDC) and Iain Chubb (formerly DCC)

Appointment of Chair and Vice-Chair

CÎIr Pulman took the chair for the election of Parish Council Chair. Cllr Pulman thanked Cllr Turner for carrying out her duties so well as Chair during the past year. Cllr Pulman invited nominations for Chair. Cllr Summers proposed Cllr Turner and this was seconded by Cllr Murray with all in favour. Cllr Turner then took the chair and invited nominations for Vice-Chair. Cllr Pulman proposed Cllr Summers and this was seconded by Cllr Murray with all in favour.

Appointment of Planning Committee, Parish Maintenance Committee, Tree Warden, Road Warden, Snow Warden and P3 Co-Ordinator

It was agreed unanimously that the whole council would be members of the Planning Committee (with a quorum of three) and that the whole council (excluding Cllr Tucker) would be members of the Parish Maintenance Committee (with a quorum of two). It was agreed unanimously that Cllr Pulman would act as co-ordinator of the Parish Maintenance Committee, that Cllr Tucker would continue as Tree Warden and Cllr Pulman would continue as snow warden (proposed by Cllr Summers, seconded by Cllr Murray). The clerk will continue to act as point of contact with the three footpath wardens for the P3 scheme.

Receive the Chair's Declaration of Acceptance of Office

Cllr Turner welcomed everyone to the meeting and thanked all the councillors for their confidence in re-electing her as Chair and said she was very happy to continue in this role. Cllr Turner then signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office of Chair.

Example 2025 Luppitt Commons Limited Report on the AGM held Tuesday 18 March 2025

The meeting began by remembering the significant contribution of the late Chris Charlton who served as Chairman and Trustee from 2005 to 2013.

Following significant legal work over the past three years, including a complicated High Court process, the Luppitt Commons Trust (established in May 1960 to purchase the freehold title of the Commons) has been replaced by Luppitt Commons Limited ("LCL"), a Company Limited by Guarantee. LCL has no shareholders but is a membership company, with members defined as those commoners having their common rights formerly recorded on register CL41 with the County Solicitor's Office at Devon County Council. It has a 12 person Board of Directors drawn from its members. LCL cannot pay dividends or distribute assets to its members.

LCL now holds the freehold title for the Commons under two title deeds (DN496960 for Hense Moor and part of Luppitt Common and DN498436 for Hartridge and part of Luppitt Common). LCL is registered at Companies House (company number 14527103) and will file, among other things, a publicly available balance sheet each year.

The rules and procedures of the Trust have been copied over into the articles of association of LCL. As before, the Board of Directors (formerly the "Trustees Committee") has oversight of all legal and financial matters, and the management of Hense Moor Common. The Management Committee (formerly the "Management Committee") continues its important role in managing the "farmed" areas of the Commons (most of Luppitt Common and the top plateau on Hartridge). As before under the Trust, the articles of association of LCL require the Commons to be managed for the benefit of all Commoners. Day to day therefore, very little has changed, other than moving the year end to December 31st and the AGM to March each year.

During 2024, **Hense Moor** has continued to be managed under the terms of the 10-year Countryside Stewardship ("CS") Agreement. We have continued the program of bracken and gorse topping, and scrub clearance on the mires. We have worked with the Butterly Conservation Trust to create a corridor to link up isolated mire habitats. We were awarded a FiPL grant for No-Fence cattle collars, using GPS to better manage livestock. Our ecological advisors estimate that conservation cattle grazing accounts for 50% of the beneficial impact to improve the condition of Hense Moor.

In addition, we continue to have two areas where wild beavers are very active. Furthermore, Gloucester University have been studying carnivorous plants in the mires, and the British Bryological Society have been surveying mosses. The 2-year hydrological study by the West Country Rivers Trust is coming to and end, and their remote monitoring equipment will be removed during 2025.

On **Hartridge** we were awarded a FiPL grant to improve the popular circular walk around the perimeter, including new pedestrian gates, track improvements and resurfacing the parking area. On **Luppitt Common** we have continued the ongoing program to replace existing fencing, and undertaken further work to fell diseased ash trees alongside the main road.

For the financial year ending 31 December 2024, LCL derived 57% of its income from Countryside Stewardship, and 43% from other sources. The publicly available year-end balance sheet values Luppitt Commons at £450,000 (or £812 per acre). Cash and investments total £196,183, although the vast majority of this (£132,461) is already allocated for future works. This is because we are paid in advance under our long-term CS agreement.

The Commons are an important part of the Luppitt Landscape Partnership ("LLP"), and LCL is the financial guarantor for the LLP. The LLP will offer us an opportunity to expand the program of conservation work on Hense Moor and along the slopes of Hartridge. Longer term, we hope to include public access improvements, perhaps including an additional circular walk. During 2024 we were once again prevented from applying for SFI on Luppitt Common and the top of Hartridge due to the unhelpful policies of the current Government, which proved very disappointing. SFI has now been suspended, but we hope that the LLP will offer an alternative route for these farmed sections of the Commons for 2026 and beyond.

Two additional topics were raised at this AGM. First, the Chairman suggested we publish an "AGM summary" in the Luppitt Packet each year. All in favour and hence this article as the first such summary. Second, a few days prior to the AGM, the Parish Council requested permission for a VE day event to be held on Hartridge during early May, with a bonfire and fireworks. Concerns were expressed by those present, including the impact on ground nesting birds and the impact on hay spots. A commoner present at the AGM made a proposal to refuse permission, and it was carried by majority vote.

THE MANY BENEFITS OF WILD GARLIC



Wild Garlic thrives in damp, cool, deciduous woodlands and sheltered hedgerows, and is at its peak in May and June. So right now, you should see, and smell, carpets of it around the Parish or even in your own garden. Not everyone loves it because it does have a very strong garlicky

smell, but it is a versatile and delicious food ingredient, being full of vitamins and minerals, plus it is known to have antibiotic and anti-inflammatory properties.

The leaves are the most useful part of the plant in cookery, but the delicate flowers, if you catch them in full bloom, make very pretty decorations for dishes, or you can dip them in tempura batter and quickly deep fry them for a nutritious crunchy snack.

One of my favourite recipes is **Wild Garlic Naans** – a quick and easy alternative to shop bought flatbreads. Delicious served warm with your chosen topping, or torn apart and dipped in bowls of stew, soup or curry.

You need 80g of blanched wild garlic leaves, patted dry and chopped, 400g self raising flour, 1tsp black onion seeds and 240g full fat yogurt.



Add the flour, seeds, yogurt and some seasoning to a bowl and add enough water to bring it together as a rough dough. Add the chopped wild garlic and knead it all for a couple of minutes to form a smooth dough. Cover the bowl with clingwrap and

leave in the fridge for an hour. Then take it out, divide it into 6 balls and roll them out to about the thickness of a pound coin. Heat a non-stick frying pan – leave it dry – and add the naans one by one, allowing them to colour on one side and puff up slightly, then flip them to cook on the other side. They should take no more than a minute or so. You can serve them straight way, brushed with butter or olive oil, or let them cool, and when you want to eat them, just reheat them briefly in the oven.



You could also serve them with Wild Garlic and Potato Soup a savoury and inexpensive soup full of goodness with the punchy taste of wild garlic.

Just saute one chopped onion in oil until softened, then add 600a of peeled and diced potatoes. Toss in the oil for a minute of two then add 1 litre of vegetable

stock. Simmer for about 20 minutes until the potatoes are soft, then stir in 70g of chopped wild garlic leaves. Blitz in a blender and reheat, adding some seasoning. You can garnish the soup with a swirl of double cream, some more chopped wild garlic and some wild garlic flowers.


June 15th Father's Day

A Traditional Devon Recipe

How to Make Devonshire Junket - from Heather Plummer

The dessert known as junket has a rich history, evolving from a medieval French dish called 'jonquet'. It's a milk-based dessert, similar to a panna cotta, traditionally made with rennet, a milk-clotting enzyme.

In medieval England, junket, made with cream and flavored with rosewater, spices, and sugar, was a delicacy of the nobility.

The term "junket" also evolved to describe a feast or banquet, and later, a pleasurable trip or excursion, especially those paid for by someone else.

Ingredients (Serves 4)

600ml whole milk 1 tsp vanilla Paste

1 tbsp Caster sugar 1 tsp Rennet

1tbsp Brandy or Rum ¼ tsp grated nutmeg

Clotted Cream and Strawberries to serve

Method

- 1. Warm the milk in a saucepan until it reaches approximately body temperature no more.
- 2. Stir through the caster sugar until it completely dissolves. Add the vanilla paste, brandy or rum and nutmeg.
- 3. Have four serving ramekins and a ladle ready at this point. Are you ready? Now add the rennet, stir through briefly and quickly but carefully ladle the mixture between the ramekins. At the point, don't touch the ramekins for at last

15 minutes, leave them exactly where they are. Allow to set at room temperature – about 3 hours.

4. To serve – you can grate over a little nutmeg, finish with a spoonful of clotted cream, or perhaps some fresh berries.

October

Wax cap walk

A chance to look for waxcap fungi, accompanied by an expert, and learn about these fascinating indictors of old pasture, which are present in great diversity in some parts of the parish.

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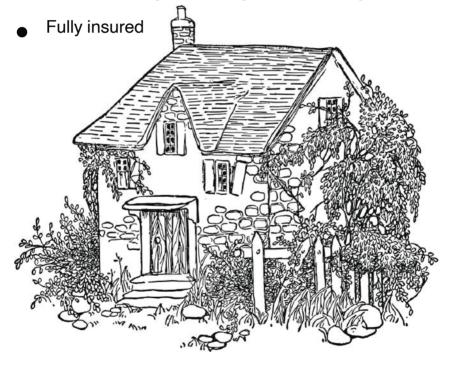
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


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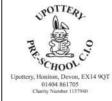
